

West Orange Rotary Donates Dictionaries to Forest Street

Once again, the Rotary Club of West Orange has come to the Township of Orange with a generous donation of new student edition dictionaries. Forest Street School was happy to welcome the visitors, Ms. Gladys Harris, President of the West Orange chapter, and Ms. Cynthia Hadley-Bailey, Member of the Board of Directors, who addressed two 3rd grade classes on November 20.

The students from Ms. Miguel's and Ms. Zuñiga's classes listened carefully as Ms. Harris gave a brief introduction to Rotary, an international service organization, that has 32 clubs in northern New Jersey and more than 34,000 clubs around the world. The goal of Rotary International is to bring together leaders and workers from all kinds of jobs and businesses to work on projects that help their communities. Ms. Harris explained that since the town of Orange does not currently have its own Rotary chapter, interested Rotarians from West Orange have stepped in for the last 11 years to provide free student dictionaries to the children in Orange schools.

Ms. Hadley-Bailey then asked students to open and explore their new dictionaries, starting with the Table of Contents. With help from Ms. Harris, Ms. Springer (Resource) and Mr. Donnelly (ESL), students took a brief tour through the dictionaries to better understand all they contain. In addition to 370 pages of "bolded", easy-to-read dictionary entries, there are over 170 more pages of illustrations, charts and documents, such as the parts of speech, maps, multiplication tables, the planets, the water cycle, descriptions of the U.S. presidents, the full text of the Constitution and Declaration of Independence, and key facts about all the major countries of the world.

MicroSociety at Oakwood Avenue Community School

In mid-November, Oakwood Avenue Community School implemented an exciting new program for all 4th-7th-grade students called *MicroSociety*. As part of *MicroSociety* students create and manage entire miniature societies in real-time, it should come as no surprise that kids across the spectrum are captivated by the

experience. In a *MicroSociety* program, students experience the pride of producing something of value to themselves and their peers; earning money and learning to be responsible with what they receive; and contributing to the community. Just like in the real world, *MicroSociety* children grapple with ethical decisions in business and political settings every day.

To-date, students have identified the necessary elements needed to develop a civilized society. They have been exposed to different types of governments, and on November 25, voted that a democracy would work best for their society. Currently, students are reviewing the U.S. Constitution and will develop their own Constitution for their *MicroSociety*. Oakwood's Constitution will be completed and ratified prior to the December holiday recess.

After the New Year, students will be creating laws and assigning street names to all corridors in the building. They will be reaching out to local and State officials, in an effort to identify one or more of them to swear all *MicroSociety* students and teachers in as citizens. During this time students will take courses on a multitude of career opportunities, and then graduate from the *MicroSociety* University. After graduation, students must join the work force as bankers, attornies, court judges, journalists, or postal workers. Should none of these career paths appeal to students, they will have opportunity to create their own businesses that are referred to as "ventures." Prior to creating a venture, students must develop a detailed business plan, which they must present and submit for approval. Once approved, students can move forward and develop their businesses.





Forest Street School's Winter Concert

with work to replicate Mexican bark paintings and painting on silk made to give the effects of stained glass.








Pictured: Scenes from Oakwood Avenue Community School's Winter Concert featuring the instrumental, vocal and drama performances.

The first step to introduce children to computer science is to participate in the Hour of Code, the largest learning campaign in history. In one hour, students (and teachers) can learn that computer science is fun, easy, and accessible at all ages. Launched in 2013, Code.org® is a non-profit organization dedicated to expanding participation in computer science by making it available in more schools, and increasing participation by women and underrepresented students of color. Our vision is that every student in

every school should have the opportunity to learn computer science. We believe computer science and computer programming should be part of the core curriculum in education, alongside other science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) courses, such as biology, physics, chemistry and algebra.
