Rosa Parks Community School Stamp Unveiling

From start to finish, the Rosa Parks Community School's Black History program, "Deeply Rooted, Deeply Guided . . . Celebrating Our Roots", was a powerful tribute to the accomplishment of African Americans. The tributes by students were in the form of music, dance, poetry, and recitation. There was a special "Stamp Unveiling", made by the United Stated Postal Service of the Oranges that capped of the event and a guest performance by the Montclair State University Dance Department.



The dance and percussion students (shown left), directed by Ms. Nadiyah Smith-McCoy and Ms. Jesenia Cruz, respectively, opened the program with an energetic West African rhythm and

dance routine.



The opening also included 3rd grader, K'Lynn Jackman (pictured left), accompanied on the trumpet by Mr. Kevin Perry, district custodian, performing "Lift Every Voice".

The dancers performed another West African piece and a lively choreographed dance to Pharrell Williams' "Happy".

The choral groups sang such tunes as "A Tisket, A Tasket" and Duke Ellington's "It Don't Mean a Thing, If it Ain't Got That Swing", by the lower grades, directed by Mr. Scott Clark, and the grades 4 – 7 Chorus, directed by Ms. Mariel Elmera, performed selections such as "Ain't Gonna Let Nobody Turn Me 'Round" and "Woke Up This Morning" (freedom song).

There were interludes of poetry by Langston Hughes, "I Look at the World" by Alrick Coder, "The Song of Smoke" by Leodson Jean-Baptiste, Marvelous Ekeh and Schundnax Emmanuel and "Mother to Son" by Nayeli Giorlando.



The Kindergartners, directed by Mrs. Mitchell, recited the ABC's of Black History Skit, naming noted African Americans from A to Z. The second graders, led by Mrs. Horne, presented "Famous African Americans", reading about each prominent African American historical figure (shown left).

The violin students, under the direction of Ms. Beulah Cox, played "I'm Gonna Sing", and "Peace Like a River". Guest pianist, teacher, Mrs. Cutugno, also provided music for the event.

A highlight of the program was the unveiling the Shirley Chisholm Stamp, the 37th stamp in the Black Heritage series that features a painting of Ms. Chisholm by artist Robert Shetterly. The United Stated Postal Service of the Oranges represented by Virginia L. Garrett, Postmaster and Ms. Rita Ridley, Manager of Learning Development and Diversity made the unveiling. Ms. Ridley read a statement, giving a biographical sketch of Ms. Chisholm, who began her career as an educator and in 1968 became the first black woman ever elected to Congress. Ms. Chisholm marked another historic first in 1972 when she declared her candidacy for the Democratic nomination for President of the United States.

Another highlight of the program was the Montclair State University (MSU) Dance Department's performance of Claire Porter's "Sentenced to Sentences", under the direction of Dr. Elizabeth McPherson. The MSU dancers, blending text with movement, gave a spectacular performance that was both instructional and creative, with choreography that captivated the audience. The dance demonstrated the form and function of "sentences" with movement and description.

Additionally, Principal, Debra Joseph-Charles, who hosted her school's program, introduced Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Ronald C. Lee and the Honorable Mayor Dwayne D. Warren, Esq. Each gave accolades to the performers and staff for a rousing tribute and Stamp Unveiling. She then introduced the last performance that closed the program. It was an emotionally charged rendition of Kirk Franklin's "Lean On Me" by the grades 4-5, led by teachers, Ms. Tynes, Ms. Holman and Ms. Devose. Students sang, performed skits, "rapped" and brought the audience to their feet, to end the program.

El Sistema Inspired Program at Oakwood Gives First Mini-Concert



The first miniconcert, "An Afternoon with the After School Strings Program," was held on March 6 at Oakwood Avenue School.

This year, in collaboration

with Montclair State University, lead agency for the Orange Public School District's newly formed University Assisted Community School, an El Sistema inspired program was born. Students in grades K - 2 have strings, music appreciation, and music theory, along with academics, four days each week after school. The strings teacher is Ms. Beulah Cox.

Parents gathered to see the progress of students and to hear the benefits of learning to play an instrument as recounted by Supervisor of Visual and Performing Arts, Mr. Peter Crosta. Principal Robert Pettit, thanked all for attending, stating this was the first of many such concerts. The Oakwood program was motivated by the acclaimed El Sistema youth orchestra system, which began 38 years ago in a parking garage in Caracas, when Dr. José Antonio Abreu gathered together 11 children to play music. The program now teaches music to more than 500,000 of Venezuela's most vulnerable children, demonstrating the power of ensemble music to noticeably change the life course of hundreds of thousands of a nation's youth while transforming their communities.



Orange Public School District Calendar Revised to Reflect 180 Days



At the March 11 board meeting, the Orange Board of Education approved revisions to the 2013-2014 Orange Public School District Calendar, to reflect 180 days of instruction.

The following days have been added to the calendar:

- / Thursday, March 20, 2014 (full day for students and staff)
- Saturday, April 5, 2014, 12:30 PM dismissal
- Friday, April 18, 2014, 12:30 PM dismissal (Good Friday)

The original calendar reflected 183 school days for students. However, due to inclement weather, schools were closed for 6 days (January 3 and 22, February 3, 5, 13 and 14) leaving three days to be made up to meet the 180 days of school mandated by the State of New Jersey.

Additionally, the Orange Education Association (OEA) requested changes to their meeting dates. The OEA meeting is now Wednesday, April 30, 2014. Students will be dismissed at 2:30 PM. The OEA meetings, previously scheduled for March 27 and May 8, have been canceled. Students will have regular dismissal on those days.

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





The Orange Public Schools Present: The Second Annual District History Bee

Students in grades 5 – 7 will compete in the Second Annual District History Bee on Monday, March 31, 2014, 6:00 PM at Lincoln Avenue School. This is a fun-filled academic event that will recognize a district history bee champion.

Students will compete as a team, rather than individuals, in a game show format using reference material provided by the National History Bee. The first round is American History, the second round is World History, and the final round (top three school teams) is a combination of both.

The Bee will follow the following structure:

• Teams will be assessed points for correct answers and points will be deducted for incorrect responses.

- The format of the questions will be a list of clues and the pairs will buzz-in when they know the answer. Only one team will be able to answer each question.
- There will be 25 possible questions in each of the first two rounds and 30 in the final.
- The school scores from rounds one and two will determine which three schools will advance to the final round.
- In the event of a tie, there will be 5 questions for the tied teams only.

The winning teams will receive trophies (one for each team member) and the first, second, and third ranked school will earn curriculum cash for the interdisciplinary support of the Common Core standards in English Language Arts, pending final approval.

Orange High School Celebrated National Pi Day on March 14 (3.14)




The Orange High School (OHS) Math Department celebrated National Pi Day on March 14th. The number Pi is a mathematical constant, the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter, approximately equal to 3.14159. All math classrooms engaged in a

fun-filled day of activities centered on learning more about the history and application of Pi in mathematics.

Students moved between various math classrooms and participated in Pi Day Scavenger Hunts, Pi Day Bingo, Pi Day Chain Links and Pi Day Story Writing. The Culinary Club, "Tornadoes on the Go", provided apple, sweet potato, lemon meringue, and other types of pies for students to enjoy after rotating through all of their classbased activities.

A Pi Memorization competition was held after school, attended by several students, with one student successfully memorizing 102 digits of this irrational number, resulting in her winning a Ti-84 graphing calculator. The Math Department ins"pi"red an appreciation for how challenging and fun learning mathematics can be.

Oakwood Avenue School Students Visit the Nation's First Historically Black College/University



During this year's African American History Month February 2014, Oakwood Avenue School paid tribute to Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU). Alumni of

HBCUs come from a tradition that has a rich heritage built upon a strong foundation. This foundation equips students to be great leaders in the workplace and in their community. This is a goal of Oakwood Avenue School.

On February 11th Oakwood Avenue School students and chaperones visited Cheyney University. Cheyney University of Pennsylvania is the first Public Institution of Higher Learning established for freed African Americans, in 1837. Before traveling to Cheyeny Oakwood's students learned that there are 106 Colleges and Universities that are part of the Historically Black College & University legacy.

This legacy began with the African Institute known today as Cheyney University of Pennsylvania. The students and chaperones were taken on tour by a Cheyney Keystone Scholar. A Keystone Scholar is a student who applied to the program as a high school senior. That senior's GPA had to be at least a 3.0. It was explained to Oakwood students that though a student may apply to be a Keystone Scholar with a 3.0 GPA the average Keystone Scholar has a 3.7 GPA.

Oakwood Avenue Students are College Bound

The culminating activity for Oakwood's College and Career Readiness Component included a project to create College Readiness Presentation Boards. The boards include facts and other forms of information gathered to help the students become aware of the requirements for college entry, as well as the yearly expense. Students also wrote an essay giving details why they want to attend college.

Each day, from February 26 through February 28, a select group of students were given the opportunity to become college recruiters. These students discussed the details of their essays and other points of interest that helped to make their boards their own.





When asked about their knowledge of colleges and universities, Oakwood Avenue students shared their recent experience in conducting research and creating presentation boards to reflect the information they gained about one college or university.

MLK Commemorative March

On March 22, the Orange Public Schools joined the City of Orange Township in a march to commemorate the historic Selma to Montgomery protest, led by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., for voter registration. The event, which took place 49 years ago, began at City Hall and ended at Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA). The march symbolized Dr. King's belief in non-violence, which was stressed as marchers walked the chosen route.

Superintendent of Schools, Ronald C. Lee, led students from Heywood Avenue School and Cleveland Street School, along with community activists, parents, teachers, and city officials with chants of "stop the violence." The Student Council from Heywood brought painted banners and signs, while the Cleveland Street Cheerleaders came with their school banner. They were enthusiastic supporters and were thanked by Superintendent Lee for their support of the event.

For students who participated, this was an opportunity to understand the historical significance of the civil rights movement. At the end of the march, Superintendent Lee addressed students and family members, gathered in the OPA gym for an athletic competition, recounting the importance of the event.


