Orange Board of Education Public Town Hall Meeting

The Orange Board of Education hosted a well attended Town Hall Meeting on October 28, as part of an annual review of student achievement. The informative meeting was opened by Board of Education President, Patricia A. Arthur (pictured below, right) and led by Superintendent of Schools Ronald C. Lee. Parents, staff members, Orange Township officials and other community members were in attendance.



At the meeting, Superintendent of Schools Ronald C. Lee (pictured above, left) and district administrators presented:

- 2012-2013 Student Achievement Data Analysis for NJASK (New Jersey Assessment of Skills and Knowledge) and HSPA (High School Proficiency Assessment) tests results
- The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC), the next-generation K-12 assessments in English and math
- Common Core State Standards
- Curriculum Realignments
- Student Growth Objectives (SGOs)
- Teacher and Administrator Evaluation Systems

The review detailed standardized test results for the 2012-2013 school year, as compared to statewide student averages and similar NJ school districts (former Abbott schools). District administrators, Dr. Paula Howard, Deputy Superintendent, Ms. Kathryn Carter, Director of English Language Arts and Testing, Ms. Tina Powell, Director of Mathematics and Science and Dr. Terri Russo, Director of Curriculum, Instruction, Professional Development, and

Data Assessment reviewed student results, presented strategic curriculum initiatives and NJ Department of Education mandates for student, teacher and administrator evaluations. Also presenting were Supervisor of Science, Ms. Erika Hackett, Supervisor of Early Childhood Education, Ms. Jacquelyn Blanton, Mr. Peter Crosta, Supervisor of Visual and Performing Arts and Director of Special Services, Ms. Shelly Harper. Each summarized their initiatives for the coming year.

At the end of the presentation, the Honorable Mayor Dwayne Warren addressed the forum, stating, "I do want to credit our Superintendent and all of our staff here on doing a great job in letting us know where we are with the assessments." He also commended the presenters for detailing plans for



"moving forward." He further encouraged the school district to do all that they can to get "parents, parents, parents" involved. "All of these programs could be a hundred times better," he said, with more parent participation.

Superintendent Lee thanked his administrators for the presentation and thanked staff members for their commitment and tireless work. He stated, "We have great teaching staff members, we have great employees here in the Orange Public Schools that care about our children," adding "We know we have work to do . . . and will make sure that the work is done." The Superintendent thanked the Board for their continued support and thanked parents, saying, "Together we can make a change."

Information tables were available at the meeting that gave attendees curriculum outlines, a copy of the presentation, various community resource pamphlet and free books for students.

Norfolk State University Choir Visits Orange

For the second consecutive year, the Norfolk State University Choir paid Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA) a visit to perform a diverse repertoire of choral music for performing arts students from each of Orange's schools. The concert, under the choral direction of Dr. Carl W. Haywood, presented genres from motets, oratorios, spirituals, gospel and rhythm & blues. The 60 plus voices filled the OPA Auditorium with beautiful vocal sounds, some accompanied on piano by Mr. Terry W. Butler with others singing a cappella.

The performance, held on October 25, 2013, was almost a year-to-date from their first appearance in Orange with a similar yet different repertoire. This visit had many new faces in the choir and Dr. Haywood, during his podium discussion with our students, had his choir members indicate their years in the ensemble and their hometown. The vast majority of the group is new, yet their vocal signature was remarkably similar to last year.

"It is the excellence," said Mr. Peter S. Crosta, Supervisor of Visual & Performing Arts, "that we must strive to achieve in all our performing groups. The model you have heard today," he told the group of students, "must be reflected in the way you reach your own audiences through your concerts." Mr. Crosta, with the efforts of Mrs. Belinda Smiley, Human Resources Director, who arranged for the choir's visit to Orange, is counting on our students being inspired by this group's continued appearances.

After the Norfolk State University Choir completed their awe-inspiring concert, Superintendent of Schools Ronald C. Lee extended his appreciation to the group for providing this musical experience for Orange's students. The group then had the opportunity to sit in the OPA Auditorium to be "thanked" by one of our own elementary choirs.

The Lincoln Avenue School Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Wendy Mir, performed a selection a cappella, in round. The piece was appropriate for this time of the year, "Have You Seen the Ghost of John?" During Mrs. Mir's introduction of her ensemble, she shared just how inspirational the Norfolk singers were to her students last year. "Ladies and gentlemen, your initial visit to this school sparked a fierce interest in my young singers. Some of them, here today for the second time, have been anxious for your return. I saw them eagerly volunteer to perform for you today. They marvel at what you do and your sound and they hope that one day they can sound just like you!"

During the performance of the Lincoln Choir, Director Haywood was seen with tears of emotion streaming down his cheeks. He was so moved by Lincoln's performance there were no words that could express his appreciation and pleasure. "Boys and girls, you have moved me in a way that I will never forget," he told the vocal ensemble as they returned to their seats. He embraced Mrs. Mir and the students were delighted that he was so pleased.



Mrs. Smiley, (pictured left) who thanked the Choirs for performing in her closing remarks, indicated that the school would receive a copy of the performance "to reflect upon in discussions and writings at their individual schools" in the weeks ahead. Mr. Crosta recorded the live concert and the students in the Digital Recording class at

OHS 11th and 12th grade students were allowed to attend the fair during the school day, in order to maximize attendance and ensure that students had an opportunity to interact with college representatives and significant staff support. School staff, including guidance counselors, were able to provide individualized support to students by directing them to speak with those representatives from schools offering their identified majors and interests.

Students were received immediate feedback regarding Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) eligibility and application completion.

Many of the schools in attendance invited Orange High School to organize a trip to tour, lunch and meet with admissions representatives from their respective schools. One such tour will be held in November when we will have students visit Rider University, Rowan University and The College of New Jersey (along with Delaware State University and Lincoln University). They are a part of a program that has mentored female students for the past eighteen years under the direction of its founder, Ms. Karen Cooper, program consultant and retired Orange School District Educator. Ms. Cooper along with a dedicated staff and volunteer Advisory Committee have guided students by modeling behaviors that will lead to a successful life.

At the group's October 16 meeting, author Saleemah Graham was a guest presenter. She led an inspirational discussion with the young ladies, using her book, "When God Was Effervescent" to share her story of triumph and achievement over life's harshest realities. Ms. Graham led an exercise where the students had to look into a mirror and write down what they saw. This exercise was developed from the author's experience as a little girl when her grandmother made her do the same thing, allowing her to truly see herself. The responses were revealing, with mentions, not only of outward appearances, such as smiles and other physical features, but also of inner strengths and resilience. Throughout the evening there were additional inputs from guests who shared their experiences and what has made them stronger individuals and has made them more successful in life. Their experience added to that of Ms. Graham, who overcame many odds including drug abuse to attend college and obtain advanced degrees. Her book was a true lesson for the female achievers who took away the meaning of "effervescent".



The Orange Township Veterans Day Ceremony took place on November 11, at Military Park on Main Street in Orange. The program, presented by the Honorable Mayor Dwayne D. Warren and the Orange Municipal Alliance, was organized by the Cultural Affairs Department.

The program was filled with tradition, such as the raising of the flag by St. Matthews A.M.E. Church Boy Scout Troop

#4749, and a military tribute to Orange's female veterans by the Orange High School Band, directed by Mr. Steven Reeves.

The honored members included: Faith Alcantara, coprincipal of Orange High School (pictured above with Mayor Warren); Hava A. Athill, City of Orange employee; Phyliss Swain, Orange senior citizen; Donna K. Williams, Orange Municipal Council President; Tarnisha Shelton and Ingrid Lops both Orange policewomen.

Ms. Alcantara and several of the honored veterans were on hand to accept a plaque from Mayor Warren, which was inscribed "A Celebration of Patriotism and Courage", with the name of the honored veteran and the branch of the military in which they served, along with the length of their service; closing with "With great gratitude and appreciation", Mayor Dwayne D. Warren, Esq., City of Orange Municipal Council, Director of Community Service.

Ms. Alcantara was a Captain in the US Air Force from 1995 to 2005. She was acknowledged for her service to this country, as were the other recipients and veterans celebrated on a day set aside to honor them.

After the plaques were presented, there was a wreath placed on a war memorial to honor all veterans. A brief reception followed, hosted by the Orange Female Achievers.

The genesis of Veterans Day dates back to 1919 when President Woodrow Wilson declared November 11 as Armistice Day, a day to remember those who died in service to this country. Armistice Day became a legal holiday in 1938. In 1954, the name was officially changed to Veterans Day under President Dwight D. Eisenhower, and November 11 became a day to honor all American veterans. On this November 11, the City of Orange presented a special salute to its female veterans.





The Orange Township Public School District has expanded its support of English Language Learners (ELL) with the Orange Newcomers Academy. The academy, launched this school year, supports students in grades 4 – 7.

The program serves students new to U.S. schools who have limited

English proficiency. They are placed in the Newcomers Academy for a 9-week intensive English language program at the district's Scholars Academy, located at 268 Capuchin Way in Orange.

The Orange Township Public The goals of the program are to:

- Develop students' essential English language listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills.
- Assist students with understanding the culture of U.S. schools and community.
- Prepare students with the necessary academic language in critical content courses in language arts, math, science, and social studies.

After completing the 9-weeks of instruction, students return to their school of service.

The Orange School District provides a strong ESL/Bilingual Program with alignment of lessons to the Common Core and WIDA (World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment). English Language Learners are tested annually, through the WIDA ACCESS, (Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State-to-State) to measure their English language acquisition.




