Digital Day of Learning

Orange Public School students participated in Digital Day of Learning on February 6, 2013. Digital Learning Day (http://www.digitallearningday.org) is a nationwide celebration of innovative teaching and learning through digital media and technology that engages students and provides them with a rich, personalized, educational experience. Digital learning involves a wide range of tools and practices, including the use of online and formative assessment, increased focus and quality of teaching resources, re-evaluation of the use of time, online content and courses, applications of technology in the classroom and school building, adaptive software for students with special needs, learning platforms, participation in professional communities of practice, access to high-level and challenging content and instruction, and many other advanced technology to aid teaching and learning.

Guided by the Technology Department, the district engaged in several activities by grade level. K-2 students went on virtual field trips at "Common Sense Media" where students experienced the power of the Internet to take them to places they might not be able to visit in person. The students learned that they should follow safety rules when they travel online, just as when traveling in the real world. <u>http://www.commonsensemedia.org/educators/lesson/going-places-safely-k-2.</u>

Students in social studies classes, in grades 4-8, participated in a blog on gun control. Students, along with some teachers also participated in a Rice Bowl competition through Free Rice, a non-profit website that is owned by and supports the **United Nations World Food Programme**. Free Rice has two goals:

- Provide education to everyone for free.
- Help end world hunger by providing rice to hungry people for free.

For each answer the student got right, 10 grains of rice was donated to help end hunger.

The Technology Department would like to congratulate Mr. Ross LeBrun, Orange High School Language Arts teacher, for winning the Rice Bowl challenge and winning a Logitech webcam for his classroom!

As a culminating event, each school also created a video for Digital Day of Learning based on the following questions:

- Teachers: How has technology changed the way you teach and learn?
- Students: How do you use technology in learning? What technology tool could you not live without?


