Greek Mythology Narrative Essay

For centuries, myths helped the early Greeks understand phenomena, or puzzling events, in nature and in human life. A wild storm could be explained as the act of an angry god; falling in love might be caused by the goddess of love; or the creation of the four seasons may be explained by Zeus' sympathy for humans. Whether these myths included gods and goddesses, their actions and adventures were used as lessons that taught important Greek values to future generations.

Prompt: After researching Greek mythology examples explaining natural phenomena, write a narrative that relates your original explanation of a natural phenomenon, including the involvement of any Greek gods/goddesses. Use imagery and figurative language to develop your work.

Step 1--Brainstorming: Begin by brainstorming about natural phenomena.

- 1. Make a list of natural phenomena. (Examples: rainbows, sunset, sneezing, animals)
- 2. Select a phenomenon from your list that is familiar to you and that you can observe.
- 3. Observe or think carefully. Find out as much as you can about the natural event that you have chosen:
 - a. What does it look like?
 - b. What does it sound like?
 - c. What effect does it have on people and places?

d. What are the scientific reasons for this event?


Step 2--Choose the god/goddess that will help you tell your story. Use the following to guide you in your writing by reading myths about him/her and complete the following information.
