Cinema Ed Presents FilmBoot24 for Orange High School Students



On Friday, March 17, students from Orange High School (OHS) will visit the campus of Drew University in Madison NJ, to kick-off FilmBoot24, a 24-hour filmmaking boot camp that is being

presented by the non-profit organization, Cinema Ed. This pilot program brings together many members of the diverse local education and arts communities including, Drew's Center for Civic Engagement, Valley Arts, the Orange Public School District and film industry professionals. The boot camp will take place over a three-day period with a culminating "Red Carpet" event, to judge and award the winning films, at Orange Preparatory Academy on Sunday, March 19.

Approximately 25 OHS students will be transported to the Drew campus on Friday and matched in teams, complete with Drew students and film making professionals who will serve as mentors. Each team picks the theme for their film from a short list of ideas that are tied to their current curriculum, and then it's off to the races. Teams get 24-hours to produce a short film.

Richard Stephen Bell, Cinema Ed Co-Founder, is looking forward to the kick-off, stating, "We at Cinema Ed believe that storytelling is at the heart of learning. Each person has a story to tell and helping discover and connect that story to a student's curriculum is what we are all about. We are very excited about FilmBoot24 and the stories that these Orange High School students will bring to light."

On Saturday, March 18, OHS students return to the Drew campus to shoot, edit and fine-tune their work with the help of Cinema Ed's professional mentors and volunteers, and Drew University resources including their Theater Department.

Cinema Ed Co-Founder Kathleen Milburn is grateful to the supporting organizations, "What an amazing collaboration it has been with Drew University, Orange School District and Valley Arts. As a young non-profit, Cinema Ed is big on vision but short on resources. We have been supported and encouraged by our team from these esteemed and progressive organizations."

The morning of Sunday, March 19th is reserved for Cinema Ed's panel of professional judges to review each team's film and determine which one will receive the Grand Jury Prize. At 3:30 on Sunday, the doors open for a "Red Carpet" event at the Orange Preparatory Academy where all films are shown at a free public screening and awards will be presented.

24[®] Game District Competition



For the second year in a row, Dr. Tina Powell, Director of the Mathematics and Science Department, and her team, have facilitated the 24® Game District Competition, pitting elementary school teams against each other in a math game that builds problem thinking skills. Beginning at the classroom level, students practiced the skills game, forming school teams to compete at a district level.

On February 8 and 10, the Math Department hosted the 24® Game Challenge at the Board of Education Administrative Building. Students who had earned a spot on their school's team competed in the competition, over a two day period, by grade levels. The 24® Game challenge is a math strategy card competition where players have to quickly calculate three separate equations using a set of 4 numbers to equal the number 24. The competition was a true team effort by Math and Science supervisors and coaches, including a formal opening with Deputy Superintendent Dr. Paula Howard.

Dr. Tina Powell welcomed the participants, congratulating all for being the best at their grade levels in this Math skills game. She introduced the competition format, followed by a PowerPoint presentation of the rules presented by Ms. Asale Harris, Supervisor of Math Grades 3 - 5. The top-winning players for each day would receive a medal and the top school a trophy to remain at the school until next year's competition. With that, students began the 24® Game challenge, monitored by proctors, at each game table.

STEM Students Visit the Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory

On March 2, ten Orange Preparatory Academy students, and six students from Heywood Avenue School visited the Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory (PPPL), in Princeton, NJ, to take part in the PPPL's STEM Day program. The Grade 8 students from OPA served as the district's Student Focus Group for the STEM Innovation Academy slated to open in the 2017-2018 school year. The six Heywood students participated as an extension of the school's annual Engineering Week program.

The experience allowed students to take part in hands-on, high level, high engagement scientific activities throughout the entire visit. Some of the activities included experimenting with copper wire, magnets, and a battery to apply principals of polarity to create a simple motor. They also studied the 4 states of matter; participating in a demonstration of the impact of liquid nitrogen on solids and its application in quickly producing ice cream, which the students were able to sample, to their delight.

The chaperones also learned a lot about fusion energy and it's benefits over the use of fossil fuels and other sources. Overall, the visit to the lab underscored the importance of having students reach beyond the four 4 walls of the classroom to interface with individuals who work in industries and career that many students may one day want to pursue. "The possibilities become so much more tangible with exposure to high-level options in science and engineering," commented Dr. Tine Powell, Director of Mathematics and Science for the Orange Public Schools.

The visit was coordinated by Mr. Larry Glover of the American Association of Blacks in Energy and chaperoned by Ms. Sica-Fosella, Assistant Principal of Orange Preparatory Academy, Ms. Faith Alcantara the Principal of Heywood Avenue School and Dr. Tina Powell.

initiative designed to create continuing theater programs in elementary schools.





Following Lincoln Avenue School was the district's Director of Special Services Ms. Shelly Harper. Ms. Harper presented the Harassment, Intimidation and Bullying - Violence and Vandalism Report for July 2016 - December 2016. The report detailed incidents of violence, vandalism, substance and weapons offenses, and harassment, intimidation and bullying (HIB).

The data displayed showed a positive trend down in a number of cases including drugs, and weapon offenses. Her presentation gave rise to questions concerning bullying. Dr. Paula Howard, Deputy Superintendent, responded that the district is looking into "restorative justice" and brain research, citing studies that indicate that children are suffering from a form of PTSD and are reacting to trauma.

Ms. Butler, who currently teaches art for the South Orange Maplewood School District, was born in Orange and raised in South Orange. She is known for her work fusing traditional quilting with modern collage techniques. Ms. Butler visited Cleveland Street School on March 8, to view the work of the students who fashioned the door using her methods along with their portraits, completed in her style, donning the hall surrounding "her" door. It was a treat for the students to meet Ms. Butler and to discuss her work. Ms. Butler shared a framed piece she had completed featuring the Haitian artist Jean-Michel Basquiat and explained her reverence for his work and the names stitched around his portrait, recent slain African Americans who gave rise to the Black Lives Matter movement.

Dorothy Height Forever 49¢ | 3 Stamp Formats

The 40th stamp in the Black Heritage series honors Dorothy Height (1912–2010), the tireless activist who dedicated her life to fighting for racial and gender equality. Although she rarely gained the recognition granted her male contemporaries, she became one of the most influential civil rights leaders of the 20th century.

The stamp features artist Thomas Blackshear II's gouache and acrylics on board portrait of Height. The painting is based on a photograph shot by Lateef Mangum in 2009.


