Sister Act at Orange Preparatory Academy

Sister Act - The Musical was an enjoyable presentation, over the four performances on stage at Orange Preparatory Academy, March 30 through April 1. Director Dana Levin, drama teacher at Orange High School, guided an artistic ensemble of actors with vocal talent in the uplifting frolic at a staid convent based on the 1992 hit movie of the same name.

Safe Routes to School

In an effort to create safe routes to school and safe spaces for students after school, the Orange Public School District is collaborating with the following organizations: New Jersey Safe Routes to School and the Orange Interfaith Coalition. Three schools have been identified (Park Avenue Elementary School, Oakwood Avenue Community School, Heywood Avenue Elementary School) to pilot a Walking School Bus for their students. The district anticipates an end of April/May launch for the reminder of the 2016-2017 school year. Additional schools will be added, if interested, during the 2017-2018 school year.

During the month of March, Safe Routes to School New Jersey visited the participating schools and provided a presentation on pedestrian safety to students in grades 2-7. Afterwards, students were invited to participate in a poster contest based on the presentations. Contest winners will be announced during the month of April.
