The Newcomers' Academy is a unique program that enables "Port of Entry" and beginner level students to receive concentrated English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction. These students, in Grades 3 – 7, who are newly enrolled at the district's elementary schools, are transported to Lincoln Avenue School daily to receive instructions as newcomers. The goal of the Newcomers' Academy is to provide them with intense English instruction in order for them to actively participate in all required course work. The program lasts 18 weeks and is administered by Ms. Caroline Onyesonwu, Supervisor of Bilingual/ESL/World Languages Programs. At the conclusion of the program, newcomers return to their home schools.

Newcomers' Academy is also available to students in grades 8-9 at Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA) and to students in grades 10-12 at Orange High School.

The registration requirements are:

- Must be resident of Orange Township
- Original Birth Certificate
- Child's Immunization Record
- Current Lease or Mortgage Statement (Note: If you are living with a friend or relative, you must be included in their lease agreement. Notarized letters stating you rent a room/apartment/house will not be accepted.)
- 2 Current Proofs of Residency (i.e. PSE&G bill, telephone or cable bill)
- Picture ID of the Parent

Additionally, The Orange Early Childhood Program includes all children regardless of abilities. If parents are concerned about how their preschool child is developing or learning differently, they can call the district to request an evaluation for preschool special education and related services.


