Health Science Career and Technical Education Happenings

During the month of February, Health Science CTE students (*pictured left*) were busy making field visits and learning from guest speakers. Senior Health Occupation students began their weekly structured learning experience at Alaris in St. Mary's long-term care facility at the beginning of the month. The students started with a tour of the facility and a lesson on safety and confidentiality issues. The students visited the same site again on 2/14 to help with decorations for Valentine's day. The same group also made a visit during February to the Fire Department to learn about the

medical emergency response measures taken by our local firefighters.

Students in the Dynamics of Health Care course were provided with two guest lecture experiences, as part of the NJ Rutgers Medical School SLAM program. Through SLAM, the medical students bring the "students learning about medicine" to life with hands on and one-on-one activities. The co-coordinators of the program are Ebony Jernigan and Candice Legister. The lessons of the month focused on the prevention of bacterial infections, cardiovascular health and stopping bleeding wounds. Hands on activities included proper hand washing fun and making an impromptu tourniquet, as well as stopping heavy bleeding wounds that occur on a limb.

Additional field excursions held in February for the Health Science CTE students included Wednesday evening trips to the Rutgers New Jersey Medical school. The first session included a presentation by Patricia Rondan-Mann titled, “The Patient Experience: Connecting Experience to Care”. Mina Ghajar, librarian on “Maneuvering Health Information Resources on the Web,” gave another presentation. The second informative session provided a talk on “HIV/AIDS: What We Have Learned from the Virus and Still Need to Know,” by Michael B. Matthews, Ph.D., Professor, Department of Medicine Sunlight and Cancer and “Imaging Screening for Breast Cancer in the High-Risk Patient,” by Basil Hubbi, M.D., Assistant Professor, Department of Radiology. The third session included talks on genetic testing by Beth Pletcher, M.D., Professor, Co-Director, The Neurofibromatosis Center of New Jersey, Director, Division of Clinical Genetics and a talk on Clinical Genomics and Personalized Medicine by, James Dermody, Ph.D., Associate Professor, Department of Pediatrics. The attendees started each evening with an hour homeroom with medical students to learn clinical skills, followed by formal lectures.



The last experience of the month, provided to the Health Science CTE students (**pictured left**), was a field visit to the dental and anatomy laboratories at the Rutgers NJ Medical School in Newark. The students were able to exam and hold real body parts that were prepared by the Lisa Gordon, Anatomy Laboratory Supervisor. The students were impressed with their experience. They held a brain, vein, artery, intestines, heart, liver, and bones!

Black History Month Stamp Unveiling at Rosa Parks Community School

On February 28, Rosa Parks Community School (RPCS) held its annual Black History Month program. The theme was RPCS Celebrates Black History and Culture, featuring song, dance and poetry, interspersed with Black History trivia, led by emcee Mrs. Mariel Johnson, music instructor.

The program opened with instrumental music teacher Mr. Sem Etienne playing “Lift Every Voice and Sing,” followed by students positioned throughout the auditorium, singing, with drums and dance, the “Lioness Hunt” from the Lion King. Student Zineb recited, “My Black is Beautiful,” by Naomi Johnson, as did Saviour Ayim reciting “I, Too” by Langston Hughes. The 2nd Grade Chorus sang “A Kid Like Me,” and a quartet of singers, Aminat Suleiman, Samantha Raymond, Marenissa Barrife and Maya Williams, soulfully sang “Stand Up for Love.”

Ms. Virginia Garrett from the Orange Post office read an overview of the late iconic dancer, actor and singer Gregory Hines before she and Principal Debra Joseph Charles unveiled the new Forever stamp.




- Category 1: Exceptional student performance for two consecutive years





Orange Prep Participates in “Skype with a Scientist”




The fruit fly for many people is quite a nuisance. They appear out of nowhere and fester around your fruit basket, if you take too long to eat the contents. However, for fruit fly scientist, Brandi Sharp, the *Drosophila Melanogaster* (fruit fly) is a pleasure to work with. Students from Mrs. Thompson and Mr. Peterson’s class learned that this fly is very important because it is the most extensively used organism for research.

Dr. Sharp explained that the fruit fly is the closest insect species to humans, having 75% of the same genes that cause disease in humans. Students asked a range of questions of the scientist from her laboratory. She shared photos of her equipment and the process used to study them. Students were intrigued when she shared that her work was fun. She said it didn’t feel like work at all. Dr. Sharp has been a scientist for 11 years and works for a Medical Institute Research Campus in Ashburn, Virginia.

Eighth grade students are currently studying human genetic disorders and genetic engineering. They are discovering how changes in our DNA impact human health and disease. They now realize that fruit flies can be used to study these diseases.

This experience (***pictured above left and right***) was made possible through “Skype with a Scientist.” Teachers can sign up and request the scientist they would like to invite to their classrooms. Thanks to Mrs. Thompson who set up the Skype experience for her students!

District Spelling Bee








