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

Angelina was diagnosed with Stage-3 breast cancer in late November 2007 and began the organization to foster breast cancer awareness, breast health education and support services to underserved and underinsured individuals and families.


Orange High School Back to School Night

It was a full evening for families attending Orange High School's (OHS) Back to School Night on September 24. Showing student leadership, the presidents of the senior class and the student council opened the program in the cafeteria with a YouTube video, "I Just Sued the School System," regarding issues with education.



Louri Ann Foster and Tino Stephens then gave the floor to Principal Jason Belton who presented accomplishments from the previous year, citing the success of several students, most notable, Jenny Rodriguez who received the National Honor Society Scholarship and is attending American University this year. Jenny was just profiled on an NBC station in Washington D.C. for her stellar accomplishment (See OHS website: https://www.orange.k12.nj.us/Domain/83.)

Mr. Belton reviewed district goals and outlined his goals for OHS, including improving passing SAT scores to an average of 1100, a graduation rate of 95%, and have 85% of seniors receive at least 3 college acceptances. Mr. Elton outlined the move of the Career and Innovation Academy of Orange to an evening school at OHS and announced several school/community events.

Parents next visited classrooms, met teachers and enjoyed snacks prepared by the Culinary Club.

With nearly 40 student and 10 parent sign-ups, and a consistent turn out of over 35 students and parents for the entire week, Oakwood's School Painting Project successfully engaged our community! Students and parents arrived at 3:00 p.m. promptly and were eager to get to work. Parents who attended were able to paint with their child and were responsible for some of our largest and more interesting paintings. Students were split up with Community School leaders in groups of 4-5 and accomplished an average of 3 paintings per day.

By the middle of the week, students took active leadership roles and led groups of their peers to complete the stairway paintings and most of our 3rd floor projects. At the end of our Painting Project Week, more than 35 students and parents and 5 teachers had actively participated each day. The week ended with student and parent requests for similar parent-student activities at OACS and a willingness to collaborate in making our school a better place.

During the week of the project, parent volunteer Destiny Epps, stated that she saw some of the paintings during Back to School Night and was extremely pleased to see the messages on the walls and liked the fact that students were asked to be involved. Destiny stated, "When the kids take the time and put in the work to do something like this, the impact is greater and they'll respect it more because it's their work."

Community School Coordinator Ericka Stevenson was very pleased with how the students worked together and helped one another throughout the week. Ms. Stevenson went on to say, "This project was so important to me because it allows students to leave something at Oakwood, that'll still be there even after they leave the school. It also just makes the building feel like a much happier place."

The Orange Public School District Early Childhood Program has scheduled registration for the 2018-2019 school year for Tuesdays, October 16 and 30, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., with the last sign-in at 12:00 p.m., at the Orange Early Childhood Center (OECC), located at 397 Park Avenue in Orange.

The Orange Board of Education provides a full day preschool education for all three and four year old residents of Orange. There is no fee for the

school day (8:30 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.).

The registration requirements are:

- 3 or 4 years old by 10/01/18
- Must be resident of Orange Township
- Original Birth Certificate
- Child's Immunization Record
- Current Lease or Mortgage Statement (Note: If you are living with a friend or relative, you must be included in their lease agreement. Notarized letters stating you rent a room/apartment/house will not be accepted.)
- 2 Current Proofs of Residency (i.e. PSE&G bill, telephone or cable bill)
- Picture ID of the Parent

Additionally, the Orange Early Childhood Program includes all children regardless of abilities. If parents are concerned about how their preschool child is developing or learning differently, they can call the district to request an evaluation for preschool special education and related services.
