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

Orange High School presents *The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940*, by John Bishop, on Thursday, December 13 and Friday, December 14 at 7:00 p.m., and Saturday, December 15 at 7:00 p.m., with a matinee at 2:00 p.m. Directed by Dana Levin, performances of this comedic murder mystery farce will take place on the auditorium stage at the Orange Preparatory Academy. Assistant Director Michael Seidel describes the production as combining "1940's show-biz types, a spooky old mansion, secret passageways, and murder most foul (and hilarious)!" Director Dana Levin exclaimed when asked about this experience, "The show is so much fun and all the actors are doing a great job of bringing these characters to life."

Synopsis - When a blizzard traps a group of actors auditioning their new play for a wealthy financier, the bodies--and laughs--pile up in this uproariously zany play. The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940 pokes fun at the more ridiculous aspects of "show biz" and the corny thrillers of Hollywood's heyday. The creative team responsible for a recent Broadway flop (in which three chorus girls were murdered by the mysterious "Stage Door Slasher") assembles for a backer's audition of their new show at the Westchester estate of a wealthy "angel." The house is replete with sliding panels, secret passageways and a German maid (who apparently "isn't quite herself today")—all of which figure diabolically in the comic mayhem which follows when the infamous "Slasher" makes a reappearance and strikes again—and again. As the composer, lyricist, actors and director prepare their performance, and a blizzard cuts off any possible retreat, bodies start to drop in plain sight, knives spring out of nowhere, masked figures drag their victims behind swiveling bookcases, and accusing fingers point in all directions. However, and with no thanks to the bumbling police inspector who snowshoes in to investigate, the mystery is solved in the nick of time and the "Slasher" is unmasked—but not before the audience has been treated to a side-splitting good time and a generous serving of the author's biting, satiric and refreshingly irreverent wit.

The small but extremely talented cast of actors that bring this production to life are all students from Orange High School: sophomore Mackela Carasco, juniors Takiyah Head and Anthony De La Rosa, and seniors Trameesha Robertson, Tyreq Moulton, Tony Fernandez, Edith Rodriguez, Felicia Adams, Kayla Wade, Marvelous Ekeh, Andrew Coats and Donte McKay. Joined by freshman understudy Brenda Palencia-Monterrosa, this cast is deep in rehearsals getting ready to make you scream with laughter!
