#### FilmBoot24 Showcases Student Films at Red Carpet Event



FilmBoot 24 works to promote filmmaking excellence among Orange High School students involved in the digital media program. Cinema Ed developed the 24-hour filmmaking boot camp, with funding from the New Jersey Council on the Arts/Department of State. The program challenges students to create and produce a film in 24 hours. FilmBoot 24 collaborators include the Center for Civic Engagement at Drew University, ValleyArts and the Orange Public School District.

The program kicked off on Friday, November 16, at Drew University, with introductions and continues with film creation, based on a

randomly drawn theme using a specified prop, Saturday, November 17, culminating with the film screening and awards presentation at the FilmBoot24 Red Carpet Event, on Sunday, November 18, at Orange Preparatory Academy.

Be there to congratulate the young filmmakers along with Kate Milburn and Richard Stephen Bell, co-founders of Cinema Ed, Dr. Terri Russo, Orange's director of curriculum and instruction, the Supervisor of Career and Technical Education Jahmel Drakeford, district administrators, film industry mentors, along with participants from the Center for Civic Engagement at Drew University and ValleyArts.

#### **Teen Summit 2018**

The ninth Teen Summit, held November 2 - 3, was a big hit with more than 300 Grade 7- 12 students, parents, guardians, community members, and city officials attending each day. The theme this year was "Building Better Relationships with Family, Friends and the World."

Interim Superintendent of Schools Ronald C. Lee welcomed everyone Friday evening, to open the program. Students participated in workshops and sessions on Friday and all day on Saturday.

Among the Teen Summit 2018 highlights was a student-suggested panel: "Racial and Ethnic Discrimination." It included a discussion about what discrimination means, the difference between racial and ethnic bias, and how to deal with it. Also, well-received was the "Healthy and Unhealthy Relationships" workshop in which students learned what to expect in healthy relationships, and how to handle unhealthy ones. The One Love Foundation and the Sadie Nash Leadership Project provided panelists for this workshop.

Friday evening also featured a performance presentation, "Rewrite a Script in Your Life," where students were divided into groups to discuss their experiences with discrimination. They selected one situation and applied what they learned in the discrimination panel to create a skit about what could have happened if there was a more positive attitude and outcome. A few of the groups performed their skits.

Also featured at this year's summit were a Leadership Workshop, Poetry Slam Workshop, and a Hip Hop Workshop. Students were able to learn about these topics in two different sessions on Friday evening and Saturday afternoon, followed by extraordinary performances at the end of the summit.

Students in the Leadership Workshop learned about leadership qualities and how to responsibly advocate for issues in their community. Poetry Slam workshop participants examined their ideas, feelings, and experiences and learned to shape them into poems that were shared at the end of the summit. Those in the Hip Hop Workshop learned a dance routine Friday evening, rehearsed it Saturday afternoon and performed Saturday evening. Three really creative and compelling events!

Saturday morning opened with a great performance by a new group, "One95," made up of former young actors from the play "School of Rock." Working with a professional sound system, group members sang "Uptown Funk," "I Want You Back" and "Happy" -- they sounded amazing.

Morning workshops included, "Dealing with Depression/How to Help Yourself Smile Every day," "Urban Living," a "Mindfulness and Meditation Workshop," "How to Get Your Life Organized," and "Great Workout Techniques."

In the afternoon, students participated in workshops that featured makeovers, dance, music, and acting, as well as mobile phone app development for Android phones, a cardiac workout and careers in technology with the CEO of Cinema Ed, Kathleen Milburn.

Parent workshops explored details of how to help children navigate challenges to be successful in school, college, post-college Education—and beyond and a discussion with Orange Business Administrator Chris Hartwyk about the community Master Plan and key community developments.

Local organization ADAPT, the Alcohol & Drug Abuse Prevention Team shared the latest information about drugs and alcohol for teens in a later-day program.

#### Scholars Academy Students Participate in the Cyber Robotics Coding Competition

On October 15, Mrs. Regina Nadbielny's 4th and 5th grade Scholars Academy students began participating in the multi-state middle school Cyber Robotics Coding Competition (CCRC). "CRCC is an innovative robotics tournament that excites and engages students in coding," explained Mrs. Nadbielny. Students are competing with other NJ middle schools for this 5th through 8th grade competition. Students are coding virtual 3D robots to perform complex tasks and missions. The first three weeks included 80 "boot camp" missions. Scholars Academy finished in 2nd place among 80 schools in NJ! Woohoo! The qualifying round began November 5 and runs through November 15. It has even more challenging missions to complete. "We are currently in the top ten and are hoping to earn an invitation to the Finals." It was a very exciting day on November 7, when the competition master of the Cyber Robotics Coding Competition, Trevor Pope, and the CEO of Intelitek, Ido Yerushalmi *(pictured right with students and Mrs. Nadbielny)* paid a visit to the STEAM (Science Technology Engineering Art Mathematics) lab in Scholar's Academy. They were very impressed with what the 4th and 5th graders are accomplishing. They were thrilled to see all of the students engaged in their coding missions and they answered many questions from the students. They explained that you never know



where coding will take you. Coding helps our students develop their computational thinking, time management and strategy skills, which they can apply to many disciplines.

#### Lunch and Learn at STEM Innovation Academy of the Oranges

On November 2, Dr. Frederick R. Lester, Chief Executive Officer of Ulwazi Analytics International, a privately-held Strategy and Data Science consultancy headquartered in New York City, addressed the STEM Innovation Academy of the Oranges at the first "Lunch and Learn Speaker Series" of the school year. Dr. Lester, an Orange resident, is renowned in the areas of Technology Innovation / Governance, Technology M&A, Knowledge Management, Data Strategy, Big Data, and Machine Learning / Artificial Intelligence. He discussed with the students his interest and abilities in math, his academic journey, attending Columbia University with a focus on nuclear physics and math and building his career.

Dr. Erica Stewart, STEM Academy principal, stated that the lunch and learn series is an effort to engage students with industry professionals in STEM-related fields or those who have STEM backgrounds. "The speakers are sharing their past and present experiences with students, entertaining questions, and hopefully bringing depth to the student's understanding of the level of commitment and work needed to be successful in pursuit of their career goals," stated Dr. Stewart.

Dr. Lester, who serves on several advisory boards, is also the Global Managing Director for the Men's Empowerment Network, a multicultural leadership development, and mentoring organization. He is an internationally recognized advisor to corporate boards, government agencies, municipalities, and the global private equity/venture capital community. He has held senior leadership positions with global technology consultancies with deal-making experience spanning the Americas, India, Israel, Ukraine, Poland, Africa, and Singapore. He is certified by the U.S. State Department to speak on the issues of technology innovation, innovation economics, and leadership development.

The keynote speakers also help to answer that age-old question: "when am I going to use this?" Students can see the relationship of their tracks (biomedical engineering, mechanical engineering, or the computing sciences) and the opportunities to connect their passions with a STEM education to contribute something great on a global level.
