On January 14, the Literacy Core at Scholars Academy ventured to Heritage Middle School in Livingston, New Jersey to compete in the Forensic Interpretative Reading Competition with 10 students representing the Junior Varsity and Varsity teams.

It was an exciting event, as the teams approached the competition with a relaxed and ready to compete mindset. Principal Karen Machuca was eager to see just what the competition was all about and volunteered to be a judge. The students on the Literacy team practiced from October to December with their stage presence, articulation, eye contact and the ability to assume the character of the novel they selected to present. They also worked on their expressions and hand gestures, while practicing not being too dramatic and not memorizing the piece they selected. This all had to be mastered within a time limit of 4 - 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. The presenters were not allowed to act or wear costumes, however, they were expected to change their voices, if there was more than one character being presented in their piece.

Career and Technical Education (CTE) Month is an annual celebration held in February for Career and Technical Education community members' achievements and accomplishments nationwide. To honor the month, the Orange High School CTE team held a CTE fair for parents and students on February 10 and 11, 2016. Students from the high school and OPA, as well as parents, had the opportunity to see firsthand the activities that take place in the many CTE classes offered here in Orange. The event allowed the OHS CTE team to raise awareness of the critical role that CTE has in preparing students for a rapidly changing workplace.

The Career and Technical Education Departments represented at the fair included: Business, Accounting, Digital Media, TV Production, Graphic Arts, Web Design, STEM/Smart Lab, Comp TIA+ CISCO, Culinary Arts/ Nutrition, Health Occupations and Structured Learning Experience. The participants were able to have their blood pressure taken, view student driven technology and digital art projects and taste food prepared by the culinary students. In addition, students and teachers were on hand to explain the classes in each track and offer advice to those, regardless of the career or education that the students are considering.

Here are some facts to consider that were published by the Association for Career and Technical Education:

- High school students involved in CTE are more engaged, perform better and graduate at higher rates.
- CTE prepares students to be college- and career-ready by providing core academic skills, employability skills and technical, job-specific skills.
- Health care occupations, many of which require an associate degree or less, make up 12 of the 20 fastest growing occupations.
- STEM occupations such as environmental engineering technicians require an associate degree and will experience faster than average job growth.
- Middle-skill jobs, jobs that require education and training beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree, are a significant part of the economy.
- CTE fulfills employer needs in high-skill, high-wage, high-demand areas.
