


The project covered additions to the Cleveland Street School including a new entrance, multi-purpose room/stage, bathrooms on each floor and a kitchen.



CLS was delighted with how the program is being run in Orange and the positive learning experiences that the students receive.

Orange High School hosted visits from RKS Associates of Jackson, NJ, operators of 4 schools in NJ for special needs students from PreK to age 21; Summit Schools, a private K-8 initiative from Northampton, PA; and Emma Willard Academy, a private girl's high school in Troy, NY.


