A trip to Howard University was the culmination of the college and career ready activities for the sixth and seventh grade students at Oakwood Avenue Community School. The Middle School students visited the school over Spring Recess on April 11, along with their chaperone. During the visit, the students participated in a scavenger hunt, where four teams of students and chaperones explored the Howard campus, finding the answers to the many questions that were on the Scavenger Hunt Sheet. teams used clues provided by Howard University students.

As they toured the campus, they were encouraged to ask students questions about the university. With quiet voices, Oakwood students walked the halls of the various academic buildings. Howard, one of the top Historically Black Colleges & Universities, is a private university in an urban environment. The students experienced "The Yard" and met some members of the Devine Nine sororities and fraternities. This was indeed an amazing trip!

Historically Black College & University Bowl at Oakwood Avenue Community School

During Black History Month, Oakwood Avenue Community School students selected various Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU) to research. They learned the history and the need for HBCUs. They also learned that most of these schools were founded after the Civil War.

The top five Historically Black Colleges & Universities were selected as the schools the students would honor. The teams: Spelman, Howard, Hampton, Morehouse and Tuskegee competed against each to eliminate one of the teams and have four teams to compete in a Historically Black College Bowl. Howard was eliminated and the four teams competed as follows: Spelman vs. Hampton and Morehouse vs. Tuskegee.

The final round of questions for the HBCU Gold Cup, Hampton vs. Morehouse, included

- 1. This organization of black women, formed in 1896, consisted of numerous regional, state and city federations. Its motto was "Lifting as We Climb," and it served African American communities by providing numerous resources including mutual aid societies, training centers, kindergartens, asylums, and health campaigns.
- 2. What was the name of the network of hiding places, which helped slaves to escape to freedom?
- 3. What influential Congressman became Executive Director of the United Negro College Fund?
- 4. Dr. Ralph Bunche became the first Black American to win what prestigious award?
- 5. On January 1, 1863 what significant declaration did President Lincoln issue?

The Hampton University Team was the First Place Winner of OACS's Historical Black History Bowl. Congratulations!

NJ Devils Honors Heywood Teacher

Mr. Kevin Rutz, STEM teacher and Schuyler Fannell, Health and Physical Education K-7 teacher, met with a representative from EverFi.com who presented a web based STEM program run in partnership with the NJ Devils and National Hockey League. It is a free program that teaches students STEM topics related to the game of hockey, and also how a professional organization is able to unify their team before every game. The program consisted of 4 areas of hockey, which Mr. Rutz and Mr. Fannell split in half, and had students work on when each teacher had a scheduled class.

For 4 weeks, the 5th graders met in the computer lab once a week, logged into their accounts and completed the topic for the day. Students took a pre-test on a topic, watched a video, engaged in an activity, and took a post-test. Next, the 5th graders would met in the gym and practiced or worked on the topic that they learned that week (face-off, shooting and passing, speed and strength). After the students completed the program and successfully practiced the topics in class, they then competed in the Heywood Hockey League, against each other, in a game of floor hockey. The students had an amazing time playing the game of hockey, and learning about it through the online program provided by EverFi.com and the NJ Devils.

As a result of the program effort, Mr. Fannell was selected as Teacher of the Month by and received tickets to attend the April 7th game against the Tampa Bay Lightning. An article, which appears on the NJ Devils website, details Mr. Fannell's accomplishment. An excerpt is as follows:

. . . Fannell, a Physical Education teacher at the Heywood Ave School in Orange, uses his class to teach students practical application of hockey skills after they'd learn the concepts through the Hockey Scholar course. "They learn about passing and shooting...strength and conditioning as well," Fannell explained. Fannell said at times it can be hard to integrate technology, a key aspect of the 21st century, into his curriculum, but Hockey Scholar naturally bridges the gap.


Forest Street School's Clothing Drive Fundraiser and Earth Day Event Submitted by Mr. Steven Dourdes, Family Liaison, Forest Street School

PARCC Testing Hampered by Technical Glitches



On April 20, Orange students, along with those across the state, were prevented from taking the PARCC exam (short for the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers), due to a "computer glitch." New Jersey was forced to postpone testing in

grades 3 through 11 for the day, as its testing vendor, Pearson, investigated what went wrong with the online testing platform **PearsonAccess**^{Next}(PAN), the entry point for PARCC users. Testing was resumed on Thursday, April 21. Notices were sent to all Orange district staff regarding procedural issues surrounding the delay in the exam process.


