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The 2016 Middle School Mathematics Olympics, organized with the assistance of Dr. Erin Krupa, from MSU's College of Science and Mathematics, began with arrival and registration at MSU. The participants, Grade 6 and 7 students, representing each of the District's elementary schools, along with their coaches and chaperones then heard opening remarks from Dr. Powell (*pictured right*), regarding the day's proceedings and the Superintendent of Schools, who traveled to the campus to offer encouraging words. They also received detailed instructions by Mr. Daniel Ramirez, Supervisor of Mathematics, Grades 6-8, for the first assessment.

The Mathematics Olympics involved several elimination rounds, organized by grade level. First was the *Written Round*, where teams were given an alloted time to solve several equations and record the answer on scannable sheets. The sheets were scored and teams were selected for the *Buzzer Round* where teams had to buzz-in with answers to complex word problems and mathematical equations. The final round was a *Video Round* which pitted the two top teams for each grade against each other to solve math problems presented in a video created by Math Adventure. The 6th grade finalists tackled *Prime Suspect* and the 7th grade finalists tackled *Wacky Factory*. Each team had to reslove various math related clues to solve the mystery or questions presented in the videos. This innovative format was interactive and allowed the entire audience to participate. It will be shared with each school for use in the classroom.

The day culminated with an awards presentation for the top teams, by Dr. Powell and her staff, and closing remarks by Superintendent Lee. All participants were recognized for their participation.

The 2016 Middle School Mathematics Olympics, while filled with academic rigor, was a rewarding experience for the students. They were exposed to a college campus environment, with spacious auditoriums, well equipped classrooms and lecture halls.

Individual School Spelling Bee winners convened at Orange Preparatory Academy Auditorium on May 24, to compete for the district Spelling Bee of Champions. Students in grades 1 - 7 competed in two rounds; an Elementary Round for Grades 1 and 2 and an Intermediate Round for Grades 3 through 7.



The program opened with welcome remarks from the Director of English Language Arts (ELA), Ms. Kathryn Carter *(pictured left).* The students had clearly practiced and were well prepared for the contest. The judges were Mr. Ronald C. Lee, Superintendent of Schools, former Board of Education President, Mrs. Patricia A. Arthur, and parent, Mr. Brandon Jones. Dr. Erica Stewart, Principal of the Career and Innovation Academy of Orange, was the accountability official, fielding challenges from the audience. She also consulted with the ELA team to aid in the facilitation of the district-wide Bee.

The rules were read by Ms. Carter before the rounds began. The first and sceond grade students were very competitive and went deep into higher grade level lists. The Grade 3 to 7 students demonstrated their preparedness, also with a competitive spirit. The overall winner of the Elementary Round was second grader Jayden Moinvil. For the Intermediate Round, the overall winner was fifth grader Moise Voltaire, the second place winner was Arielle Hamilton and the third place winner was Genesis Jones.

Junior Achievement Career Success Workshop

The beautiful campus of Drew University, located in Madison, NJ, was the site for a *JA Career* Success ™ Workshop for students in grades 9-11. Twenty students from Orange High School were in attendance on May 18. Orange High School was one of eight schools from New Jersey to take part in this event. The workshop was sponsored by Junior Achievement of NJ and underwritten by Accenture. Christy Tighe, JA VP for Education and Programs was the moderator.

JA Career Success[™] equips students with the tools and skills required to earn and keep a job in high-growth career industries. The focus was on students understanding the importance of building the "four C's": Communication, collaboration, creativity, and critical thinking.

Upon arrival students were placed in groups with the students from the other schools. The agenda for the day was filled and brimming with interesting topics. After Welcoming Remarks, given by Bob Massa, SVP of Enrollment for Drew University, the day was off to a fast start. He discussed the importance of a well-rounded college education and how it relates to employment opportunities.

Guest Speaker was Mark Biedron, President, NJ Board of Education. Additional speakers were Ryan Darlington from Accenture and Jerry Wade from MetLife. Other professionals from Accenture, MetLife and New Jersey Business & Industry Association were "table coaches" for the students. All the professionals in attendance shared their career journey, which has led them to their current position.

Ryan Darlington shared a fact from a recent survey where companies reported that 75% of college graduate new hires were let go due to the lack of soft skills (e.g., interpersonal communications skills). He also stressed that while soft skills cannot be taught in traditional methods, good habits are what strengthens a person's soft skills. Students engaged in an activity where the focus was on how to recognize individual soft skills, which can set someone apart from others, in the interview process.

The students also had to work together to build a structure from some simple materials. They used the GRPI model; Goals, Roles and responsibilities, Processes and Interpersonal Relationship Skills (Six Sigma)

While enjoying the lunch provided, students continued to network and engaged in mock interviews with each other.


