Welcome Back Students

September Board Of Education Meeting

At the monthly Board of Education Meeting, held on September 13, Board President, Ms. Cristina Mateo (pictured right with Vice President E. Lydell Carter, Superintendent Lee and Board Attorney Ronald Hunt) applauded at the announcement. In July, Superintendent Lee had presented the board with a letter stating that he would retire in December 2016.

The announcement by Board President Mateo was preceded by the Superintendent's Report pointing out several key events:

- There was a closed board meeting to discuss 2016-2017 Goals and Objectives
- Meetings have been scheduled with the Police Department to further develop a closer working relationship to benefit the student body and the community

Orange Board of Education To Offer Superintendent Lee a 3 Year Contract

• There was a town hall meeting to discuss school funding, led by Mayor Dwayne Warren, with State Senate President Stephen Sweeney, held at St. Matthew Church on September 1, 2016. The town hall meeting lent support to Senator Sweeney's school funding formula, in contrast with Governor Christie's formula, which is detrimental to the district. There was a call for action to mobilize the community to support adequate funding for the Orange Public Schools. See nj.com September 6 article: *Sweeny Sweeps Up Urban Allies in Fight Against Christie's Fairness Formula.'*

Superintendent Lee stated that the district stands to loose 42% in funding, under Governor Christie's \$6,599 per student proposal, or \$33M in budget.

Responding to concerns voiced at the August 2016 monthly board meeting by football Coach Randy Daniel, Superintendent Lee reported that he had met with the district's athletic coaches and reviewed a proposed amendment to school policy. The amendment would allow a one time second chance for athletes not meeting the required 2.0 GPA necessary to participate in sports. The school policy will be amended and brought to the board for approval. Park Avenue School hosted the September board meeting. Principal Dr. Myron Hackett introduced the school's chorus, stating that they wanted to perform in lieu of a video/PowerPoint presentation, even though they only had 3 days to prepare. Led by vocal music teacher Scott Clark and accompanied by instrumental music teacher Thaddeus Hammond, the students sang *Lost Boys* and *Count on Me Like 1-2-3*, to a delighted audience.

The First Day of School

The first day of school went smoothly, on September 8, for the Orange Public School District. Students, clad in their uniform attire walked eagerly in to school, many with anxious parents, as they were entering for the first time. The Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Ronald C. Lee, visited the schools to show his support for the administration and staff and to greet students. District directors and supervisors also made the rounds, assessing the school opening and offering assistance.

At the Orange Early Childhood Center, students were welcomed and made to feel at home. Elementary school students settled in to new routines and met their new teachers. During classroom visits, students were fully engaged on their first day back and ready to start the new school year. Superintendent Lee commented, "It's a good sign when students are so engaged in schoolwork that they are not distracted by visitors to their class."

At Orange Preparatory Academy and Orange High School (OHS), "a few good men," consisting of a group of community leaders, school staff and parents were present to greet students. Included in the group on hand were Mr. Reggie Miller, director of the Male Student Support Program, former Councilman Elroy Corbitt, OHS paraprofessional and Parent Academy president, Mr. Dwight Holmes and parent, Mr. David Armstrong. Mr. Patrick Morrissey, Executive Director of HANDS, OHS alumni Kamani Gibson, Councilman Harold J. Johnson, Firefighter Leonard Stewart and others, joined them to welcome students back to school.

Once in school middle and high school students received their schedules, reviewed school goals and displayed anticipation for an exciting school year.

The Orange Education Foundation Directs Donor Funds to Student Summer Programs in 2015 and 2016

In collaboration with the Ralph Errington Charitable Foundation, the Orange Education Foundation has sponsored over 200 Orange Public School students to attend various summer programs during the past two summers. The Ralph Errington Charitable Foundation, which represents the estate of Kenilworth Tool and Die owner Ralph W. Errington, has supported Orange, through a co-trustee of the foundation, Mr. Terry Zuckerman.

With donations from the Ralph W. Errington estate, 40 students were able to attend the Turtle Back Zoo Summer Program in 2015, totaling \$13,600, and 52 students were able to attend in 2016, totaling \$17,880.

The Ralph Errington Charitable Foundation also sponsored 21 students to attend the Frost Valley Camp in New York's Catskills mountains, in 2015, totaling \$35,080, and 47 in 2016, totaling \$79, 900. In addition to the scholarship amounts per camper, \$35.00 was put in the camp store, each year, to afford Orange students the same opportunities as their peers for shopping. Additionally, \$200.00 was given to each family in 2015 to purchase camp supplies. The Orange Education Foundation purchased supplies this summer for any camper needing assistance.

Additionally, through the donor funds, the Orange Education Foundation sent 35 students in 2015, totaling \$42,350, with a student admitted at no cost, and 49 students

for the 2016 school year for \$59,220, with some students being tuition free, to NJIT's Center for Pre-College Programs. This 4-week intensive summer initiative engaged students, in grades 4 -12, in classroom discussions and lectures, laboratory experiments, demonstrations in advanced topics in mathematics, geometry, trigonometry, environmental science, physics, engineering, computer programming and application, and language arts.

"The summer camps are educational, developing health awareness, social values, cognitive and intellectual skills in incredibly enriching, exciting, challenging, supportive, fun filled environments," said Ms. Clark. "Our kids are very fortunate to be able to participate in these phenomenal adventures and experiences that are memorable and beneficial for a lifetime."

The Orange Bridge Program

Orange's bridge program has existed since its inception, in 2003, at the Saturday Discovery Program. The program currently operates before and after classes at Oakwood Avenue School, serving approximately 25 students. At Park Avenue School, the afterschool program also serves approximately 25 students. A new program was started at Rosa Parks Community School last year. Under the umbrella of the American Contract Bridge League (ACBL) (District 3/Unit 140), support is provided through grants for trips to tournaments, refreshments, teacher's manuals, trophies, cards and ACBL student memberships. Additionally, teacher volunteers from the ACBL teach and mentor Orange's students.

The Ralph W. Errington Charitable Estate has contributed \$10, 000 annually, since the 2014 school year, to promote the bridge program in Orange.

The foundation's contributions are used solely for the Bridge Program in Orange and have been primarily used for teacher stipends and transportation.

It is anticipated that the Orange bridge program will continue with new schools being added to the roster. A bridge academy is being explored for further outreach, supporting beginning programs and online tutoring. A program spanning the gap with parents, seniors and youngsters is also being considered.

The Orange Bridge Program has continued, largely with the support of Ms. Barbara Clark, retired Director of Special Services for the district and an avid bridge player. She currently serves as the Youth Bridge Coordinator for ACBL District 3/Unit 140 and is the Treasurer of the Orange Education Foundation. Ms. Clark credits dedicated bridge coaches, Ms. Pamela Venable, Guidance Counselor at Oakwood Avenue School and Dr. Denise Harlem, Technology Coordinator at Park Avenue School, for the success of the programs at their schools. She also extends gratitude to the Orange Public School District and the Orange Education Foundation for the continued commitment and support they demonstrate for the Bridge Program in Orange!

Back to School Night at Scholars Academy Preschool



Principal Karen Machuca *(pictured left)* hosted the district's first Back-to-School-Night on September 12 for the Orange Early Childhood Center II preschool at Scholars Academy. The evening opened in the school's Oasis Café with remarks from Principal Machuca. After introducing the teaching staff, she outlined the school's expectations for providing the best learning opportunities for students, including attendance and participation. There were also remarks from Early Childhood Education (ECE) Master Teacher, Mrs. Amy Burns, who gave an

overview of the High Scope curriculum used in the preschool. High Scope, which features an "active learning approach," is aligned with NJ State Standards and Common Core. Ms. Carol Daly, school counselor, addressed parents, as well, mentioning her availability to coordinate family services, the need for volunteers at the school and participation in the *Square lArt* fundraiser. Attending families were invited to visit their child's classroom for a more detailed overview from teachers, after hearing from the school nurse regarding state mandated flu shots and a reminder not to send children to school if they are ill.
