

Forest Street School Displays Art in Celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month



Math Night at Oakwood Avenue Community School

Math Night at Oakwood Avenue Community School was held on October 8. Teachers from kindergarten to third grade created and presented games to parents to help facilitate their children's math progress. Each teacher had a table and had materials along with instructions for parents, who were their child's partner, to independently play after a quick demonstration from the teacher.

The goal of each activity was to help parents understand that few and simple materials, along with a focus on the standards, will help their child in math very quickly. Some games that were presented were: K/1st grade teachers Ms. Gomez's *Roll the Dice* to complete the pumpkin picture and *Race to 50*. Both games focused on number identification. In *Roll the Dice*, children had to identify numbers on dice and draw that corresponding part on their pumpkin. *Race to 50* had similar materials.



Ms. Kenny and Ms. Miola's Kindergarten team focused on activities using materials parents may have at home. For example, a muffin tin for sorting and counting, building number towers using Legos, and a "top it" game with a deck of cards. They also showed families how to be inventive with materials, like using a chopstick and paperclip as a spinner.

First grade introduced 4 games each at *Math Night* that focused on fact fluency that are critical areas for grade 1. Ms. Sbarro, along with Ms. Francis, each had a table and briefly presented the instructions along with the importance of the games. The only materials that were needed were playing cards, index cards to write down the Math talk players are expected to say and a composition book to document progress.

Ms. Hunt's 1st/2nd grade students, along with their parents, enjoyed games *Beat That!* and *Take Ten*. The objective of *Beat That!* was to add dice that are rolled. The game can be competitive by charting the points. Player who gets 15 first wins. *Take Ten* is another take on a memory card game, where the only difference is that partners need to find 2 cards that equal 10. Some scaffolding suggestions were to use either lower digits to find the sum or higher digits as a challenge.

In second grade, Mr. Willis focused on place value. He presented the chart and how to use it. Partners rolled dice then represented numbers on the place value chart. Afterwards, students compared numbers against their parents to see who had the higher amount.

Ms. Dominique and Ms. Pugh represented third grade with the "rounding game" and "doubles plus one". The "rounding game" centered on identifying multiples of ten and round whole numbers, and "doubles plus one" practiced doubles and doubles plus one fact families.

It was exciting to all the teachers how engaged the parents were to learning all the math skills and concepts. Teachers felt this was probably due to the fact that there wasn't a need to read a set of instructions or buy a laundry list of materials. All the materials that were needed for any of the games are either found at home or at the local dollar store for under \$5.00. Parents bonded with their child over math and students were so engrossed they didn't seem aware of how much learning was actually taking place. It was a great night had by all!




