- **Orange Public Schools Earn Middle States Accreditation**



Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools Commissions on Elementary and Secondary Schools

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — The Middle States Association Commissions on Elementary and Secondary Schools announced today that the Orange Public School District in Orange N.J., earned accreditation, the gold standard for measuring and evaluating school performance.

"The accreditation process examines schools and school systems in a holistic way, supplementing student testing data to provide a more complete measure of performance and chart a strategic and realistic course for continuous school improvement," said Henry G. Cram, Ed.D., president of the Middle States Association Commissions on Elementary and Secondary Schools. "At the Middle States Association, we look at the whole school – not just test scores – because we realize that improving outcomes requires a comprehensive approach."

Accreditation is a self-evaluation process that schools and school systems voluntarily use to demonstrate they are meeting a defined set of research-based performance standards. The 12 Standards for Accreditation are: mission; governance and leadership; school improvement planning; finances; facilities; school organization and staff; health and safety; information resources; educational program; assessment and evidence of student learning; student services, and student life and activities.

The accreditation process begins with a self-study that is conducted by the school and school system and requires input from school leaders, teachers, parents and students. Following the self-study, a team of volunteer educators from Association member schools conducts an on-site peer review visit to observe school operations and interview various stakeholders.



The visiting team makes its recommendation to the Middle States Association Commissions, which voted to accredit or reaccredit 211 schools and school systems in 18 states and Puerto Rico and 20 countries at its biannual meeting earlier this month.

"Accreditation is an independent validation of the good work we are already doing and has served as a cost-effective and comprehensive approach to charting a course for the future," said Superintendent Ronald C. Lee. "We are pleased to have earned Middle States accreditation and to be recognized for our commitment to preparing all students with equitable opportunities for college and career readiness, leading to lifelong learning and responsible citizenship in a competitive global community."

All 11 schools were accredited as a system.





Tennis for Cleveland Street Students

Students at Orange's Cleveland Street School had the opportunity to learn the game of tennis at the Berkeley Tennis Club facility, during their assigned gym class in October. Through grants from the United States Tennis Association (USTA) and the Orange Police Athletic League (PAL), students were funded to take two lessons per week for four weeks. Only two weeks of lessons were completed. There are plans to provide the other two weeks of lessons in the spring, after the weather warms up, possibly as a post-PARCC celebration.

The 7th grade gym class and a self-contained class of 6th and 7th grade students took tennis lessons in place of two gym classes per week. The lessons were aligned with the Physical Education curriculum standards. The instructors were Bob Bynum and Al Crook of Bob Bynum's Match Point Tennis. Both are USPTR (United States Professional Tennis Registry) certified tennis coaches. They have been teaching and coaching tennis for over 30 years.

"This was an opportunity for our students to learn about more sports than those typically offered in the community and to students in their age group, "said Dr. Cayce Cummins, principal of Cleveland Street School. The program will also serve to be a feeder into tennis programs at the upper grade levels. This could foster a strong enough program in Orange to open doors to admissions and scholarships for college. "I earned a four year tennis scholarship to Howard University," added Dr. Cummins. "Not only did it fund my education, but tennis provided experiences in competition and traveling that I wouldn't have had otherwise."

For the students it was great for them to have access to tennis courts. Cleveland Street School is one of the older schools in the district and lacks any sports facilities. Tennis exposed them to a new sport and a top-notch facility in the area.

Their Physical Education teacher, Mr. Edward Harris, a supportive force behind the program, accompanied the students. The chaperones were Mr. Dan Turk, who cataloged the activity with

pictures of the various lessons, along with paraprofessionals, Mr. Spillman and Ms. Phillip.

Dr. Cummins was also present for some of the lessons. "The students absolutely loved it. We have never seen them smile so much while working so hard!" She is hopeful that the lessons that they learned on the court will transfer into life and academic situations, making them more resilient. "They were disappointed when the program for this season came to an end."

"We welcome programs that broaden our students' experiences," said Superintendent of Schools, Ronald C. Lee, who is keen to provide such exposures to Orange's students. Also, the Honorable Mayor Dwayne D. Warren visited, on the last day of the fall lessons, and expressed his pride in the students and their efforts.
