

# The Female Achievers "Young Women In STEM" Presentation



The Female Achievers, mentoring program, led by Ms. Karen Cooper, attended an informative presentation for the mentees, in mid January, prepared by Mr. Max Nixon, SmartLab

instructor (pictured during presentation) at Orange High School.

The presentation, "Female Achievers - Young Women In STEM" was designed to expose these middle and high school students to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) education, in order to encourage them to join aspire to careers in STEM.

Mr. Nixon defined the study of STEM for the students, detailed various STEM careers and fields where women dominate, such as clinical laboratory technologists, accountants and auditors. He highlighted the challenges to entering STEM careers including the lack of mentors for women and low acceptance in male dominated fields. Strategies to overcome some of the challenges were noted including finding female friendly companies and joining organizations such as the "Society of Women Engineers" for mentoring and networking opportunities.

As part of his presentation, Mr. Nixon showed a video, made by former STEM students, promoting the OHS STEM Club. He followed his session with Questions and Answers and evaluation comments. Some of the comments were as follows:

- "I would like to learn more about editing music, movies and pictures"
- "Today's workshop was fun and we should do more workshops like this"
- "I would like to do more hands on things"

In response, Mr. Nixon plans a Part II follow-up workshop and states, "I will have the young women participate in a Rube Goldberg Challenge." Students will be asked to create a Rube Goldberg machine, which is an intentionally over-engineered or overdone device that performs a very simple task in a very complex manner.

The students had pizza/soda and were given gift bags, presented by Ms. Pat Thomas of the Links Organization.

The Female Achievers mentoring program has operated for the past eighteen years, under the direction of its founder, Ms. Karen Cooper, program consultant and retired Orange Public School District educator. Ms. Cooper, along with a dedicated staff and volunteer Advisory Committee have guided students by modeling behaviors that will lead to a successful life.



On February 8, 2014 Orange Public Schools hosted the third annual "Spelling Bee of Champions". Students from first through seventh grades represented their schools, in grand style, by going multiple rounds and exhausting the word lists. New to the event this year was the "WEE BEE". Nine kindergarten students demonstrated their spelling readiness by successfully completing the Dolch sight word list. The older students spelled words like 'genoise', 'accouterment', and 'chimera'.

Parents and family were present and engaged in the bee, either cheering on or advocating for their super spellers. The battle was intense for the final three positions and an honorable mention went to 7th grader Antonio Leyva from Park Avenue School for his effort in competing for the top positions.

Forest Street is the home school for the third place winner overall, 7th grader Mageenah Dacy and Heywood claims bragging rights for the top two positions with 4th grader Duke Richman in second place and 7th grader Muhammad Haque claiming the victory by spelling 'isochronous'.

"The performance of our students was a testament to parental involvement, our focus on literacy, and our students' earnest desire to make us proud," said Ms. Erica Stewart, Administrator for Special Projects, who coordinates district academic challenges. # **Celebrity Read at Rosa Parks Community School**

On February 6, 2014 Rosa Parks celebrated Celebrity Read in partnership with The United Way of Essex and West Hudson County. Celebrity Read has touched the lives of thousands of students in communities in New Jersey, for over 20 years. All 954 students who attend Rosa Parks Community School from grades pre-K to seventh participated in this year's Celebrity read. Volunteers from the community, as well as, Montclair State University entered the classrooms to read to our students.

United Way of Essex and West Hudson's Community Impact Plan addresses issues that prioritize the creation of and investment in strategic collaborations to address our 10-year goals in education, income and health. One of the benchmarks in United Way's 10-year goal to decrease dropouts by 50% and increase graduation rates by 87% is to ensure that youth in our community are reading proficiently by 4th grade.

Reading proficiency by third grade is the most important predictor of high school graduation and career success. Celebrity Read is a "local legacy" literacy initiative that recruits volunteers to model their love of reading and the pursuit of education, as a pathway to success in elementary school classrooms.


The program preserves the legacy of jazz and blues by introducing the art form to public school children, while supporting musicians who shaped this music legacy.
