Live Cardiac Surgery Broadens Students Exposure to the Medical Field



On Monday October 29, 2012, a select group of Orange High School students will be able to view and interact with a surgical team from Newark Beth Israel Hospital while they perform cardiac surgery through Liberty Science Center's Live From...Cardiac Classroom™. Approximately 30 students, who are members of Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) and those following a pre-med curriculum, will be able to ask the surgical team questions during the surgery. Dr. Patrick Howell, Assistant Principal at OHS, who coordinates the science curriculum for students in grades 8 − 12, has arranged the program that will be viewed live from the high school. "From the first incision to the last suture, our students will

experience the excitement and drama of the surgery through real-time videoconferencing," said Dr. Howell. "They'll have a front-row seat to experience surgery as it happens!"

The interactive session will allow students to view the surgery on a 9 X 12 screen or SMART board.

In preparation for this event, teachers have been working with their students to practice questioning skills in order to optimize their experience. In addition, students have been exposed to the following content areas/activities:

- The Heart and Circulatory System
- Coronary Artery Bypass Grafts
- Cardiovascular Disease: Risk Factor
- (Classroom Activity 1: Lung Capacity)
- (Classroom Activity 2: Heart Rates & Abnormal Rhythms)
- Take-Home-Worksheets (Personal & Family Health History)



The Calling All Men Campaign is in Full Swing



Calling All Men (CAM) is a dynamic campaign by the Orange Public School District to get more fathers engaged in their child's educational life. CAM will host a series of programs and activities throughout the school year designed to increase the involvement of men in the lives of their children.

The district launched the program with the Million Father March on the first day of school and hosted "manUp the Play" for fathers and their families on October 25. The play, written, produced and performed by Orange High School staff member Elijah M. Brown and his associate, Jamal T. Hinnant, showed the audience the connection between a teacher and a student and the challenges many young people face.

Under the Calling All Men campaign umbrella, the following activities are planned:

- Fathers Reading Club: Contact your local elementary school regarding the reading program held on the last Friday of each month.
- * Fatherhood Football Fellowship: Sundays during football season at Park Avenue School.

On October 25, "manUP the Play" was presented, free to the public at Park Avenue School.

Cleveland Street Students Visits Essex Environmental Center

On October 9, 5th and 6th grade students from Cleveland Street School were invited to attend the Essex County Environmental Center in Roseland, through a grant from the Landsberger Foundation that provides inner-city children with hands-on educational opportunities to learn about the environment.

Over 54 students dressed for the occasion to walk through the woodland and down to the Passaic River to perform different science experiments. Three teachers from the center broke the students into groups to discuss the ecosystem, frog pond environment, and the Passaic River's history.

Fifth graders learned about the Lenape people and how they lived in wigwams, stored food, and what they wore to survive in harsh climates. Students participated in an activity to show the foo

Sixth graders viewed a PowerPoint history presentation on the beginnings of the Passaic River. The students were grouped for different experiments on turbidity, pH, dissolved oxygen, and water temperature. After the students gathered data about the Passaic River, each group had to report their findings. Later on, students waded in the river to collect macro organisms to determine pollution levels.

Parents as Literacy Supporters (PALS)

The Parents as Literacy Supporters (PALS) was born out of an initiative to celebrate parents as their child's first teacher, to provide families with a format to experience the joy of literature and to help parents reinforce important early literacy skills at home. The program establishes and sustains a home school connection and supports preschool student literacy achievement.

PALS is sponsored by the Office of Early Childhood and is a true team effort. The program consists of a series of sessions for parents, their preschool and kindergarten aged children (siblings are welcome). The facilitator leads the group through literacy rich activities such as stories, songs and games that focus on rhyming, comprehension and phonemic awareness. In addition, the facilitator points out what skills are being reinforced and explains how adults might do a similar activity at home. The Office of Early Childhood Education endeavors to present the workshop in English and Spanish whenever possible.

PALS was held at Heywood Elementary School, in Ms. Springer's classroom, on October 22. Another session is scheduled Monday November 12.

Cleveland Street School's Spanish teacher, Srta Arias, also had students dancing in the halls to celebrate Hispanic culture.


