Summer Academic Instruction, Visual Arts and Fun in the Orange Public School District

This summer the Orange Public School District operated a half-day Summer Academy at Heywood Avenue School, Lincoln Avenue School, Rosa Parks Central Community School, Scholars Academy and Park Avenue School. The program offered academic enrichment and remediation in the areas of mathematics and English language arts where students honed their math skills through investigations, math games, and internet activities, along with reading, writing, speaking and listening activities. Students focused on Common Core skills that are additions to the NJ Core Curriculum Content Standards.

In the elementary schools, students demonstrated mastery of new skills through Math Carnivals held at each site where students gave presentations on math activities and manned booths testing their mental math skills. In Language Arts, the students completed research and read informational texts in line with the new Common Core standards. The research and readings were used to write arguments that gave textual evidence to support claims and counterclaims. Students in grades 1 and 2 wrote opinions about particular authors' writing styles, and those in grades 3-7 researched and wrote argument essays about controversial issues. On the last day of the Summer Academy, the elementary schools sent their top teams to a culminating debate held at the OPA auditorium. Thirty-four students won medals for the strength of their arguments.

Carnival. The day opened with an Awards Ceremony acknowledging students who received awards for attendance, most improved, best overall and most conscientious. There was a "wall walk" to showcase work completed by the students in English Language Arts and Mathematics. All the students and over 30 parents who were in attendance had an "absolute blast" playing the various games at booths set up and managed by the students.

The Orange Summer Academy ran from June 25 through August 2, from Monday through Thursday, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. There were 1,106 students in grades 1-7 who participated from across the district. Additionally, 124 students in grades 8-9 attended the Summer Academy at OPA, and 206 students in grades 9-12 attended Orange High School's Summer Academy.

Extended Day Summer Program:

Students in grades 1 – 7 also had the opportunity to participate in a full day program, from June 25 – August 3, operated in partnership with Arts Unbound at Lincoln, Park and Heywood Avenue Schools and operated by Family Connections/Community School at RPCCS. Students in the extended full day program remained at their summer school locations from 12:30 to 5:30 p.m. each day and also on Fridays, from 8:30 – 5:00 p.m. These students enjoyed extra activities in the areas of arts and crafts, physical education and local field trips including swimming.

Students Achievement at New Jersey Institute of Technology

Approximately thirty-five students from the Orange Public Schools had the opportunity to participate in the New Jersey Institute of Technology (NJIT) Center for Pre-College Programs (CPCP) summer camps. The various programs, available through CPCP, offered Orange's students, grades 4 – 12, the chance to complete hands-on science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) projects on the Newark campus of NJIT. They were bused daily from Orange High School, Monday through Thursday, from July 9 – August 9 to attend classes.

Included in the CPCP summer camp is the Women in Engineering and Technology Initiative-FEMME Program, which offered young women "opportunities to enhance their academic abilities in mathematics, science and technological academic achievement, develop problem-solving and critical thinking skills, and promote self-esteem and self-confidence."

"The goal of FEMME is to encourage girls to choose careers in scientific and technological fields in which women are traditionally underrepresented. FEMME provides an intensive five-week summer component for five groups of female students and includes classroom discussions, laboratory experiments, projects, and field trips."

In addition to the NJIT's pre-college program, Orange High School students participated in NJIT's Real World Connection (RCW), which ran from July 9 – August 7, 2012. In this program, students worked in small project groups to solve real-world problems addressing varying aspects of business, communications, architecture, sports and entertainment. NJIT students, NJIT alumni and industry experts coached the students. The program also included field trips and sports activities.

On August 7th RWC held its "Students' Projects Showcase" at Liberty Science Center. The daylong event was a showcase of science, art, and technology by the Orange students who were part of twelve high school teams, along with college teams, that presented their real world project accomplishments. The event, attended by Superintendent of Schools, Ronald C. Lee, was marked by innovative solutions, a fashion show and included a certificate and awards presentation.

First Annual Transitional Program For Orange Preparatory Academy



In early part of August 2012, Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA) offered its first annual transitional program for incoming 8th grade students. OPA's Support Service Staff members, Darryl Smith, School Counselor and Malika Berry, School Social Worker, facilitated the program over a one-week period, with 45 students in attendance.

The program was provided with the firm belief that the more connected students are to their school, the better they will do in all the measures that are important in tracking their success: grades, test scores, attendance, and discipline. "When students are connected to school, they *want* to be there, and this makes all the difference," says Darryl Smith. "Students who are attached to school and to each other perform better."

Incoming students had the opportunity to hear what classes they will have to take, where those classes are, what rules are important, how to build relationships within the school and what opportunities are available. Students also had the opportunity to participate in a lecture series from several community outreach programs, including New Jersey SEEDS, Covenant House, and Planned Parenthood. These outside agencies provided students with working knowledge and tools to be socially productive in their academic development.







The Transitional Program at Orange Preparatory Academy addressed the need for information by creating a

dissemination process that uses the student-to-student relationship. This includes both one on one interactions and connections in small groups and makes it far more likely that critical information is received and remembered.
