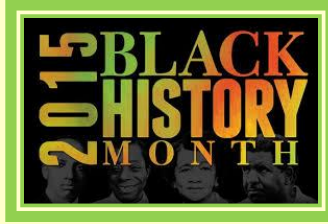

2015 Theme A Century of Black Life, History, and Culture

Black History Month, or National African American History Month, is an annual celebration of achievements by black Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of African Americans in U.S. history. The event grew out of “Negro History Week,” the brainchild of noted historian Carter G. Woodson and other prominent African Americans. Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating black history.

Over the past century, African American life, history, and culture have become major forces in the United States and the world. In 1915, few could have imagined that African Americans in music, art, and literature would become appreciated by the global community. Fewer still could have predicted the prominence achieved by African Americans, as well as other people of African descent, in shaping world politics, war, and diplomacy. Indeed, it was nearly universally believed that Africans and people of African descent had played no role in the unfolding of history and were a threat to American civilization itself. A century later, few can deny the centrality of African Americans in the making of American history.

Assessments have become a critical piece to education reform. To prepare students well for college and career means they must deeply learn the material and its application to their lives and future learning. That means using classroom management skills to assess student knowledge authentically and accountably.

This doesn't stop with classroom management activities like quizzes, tests, and memorizing facts. Those approaches may be prescriptive, but they don't measure results in a way that leverages learning.

A well-formed assessment is not always measured by a grade, as is common in summative assessments. Sometimes it derives evidence of learning from anecdotal observation, watching students apply prior learning, working in groups, or participating in classroom discussions.

Thanks to technology, there are lots of fun and effective ways to assess learning in ways that transform your classroom. At least seven ideas are as follows:

- Classroom Management: Polls
- Warmups and Exit Tickets
- Quick Quizzes
- Game Shows
- Virtual Wall
- Brainstorm
- Differentiation

ProjectWriter is a new web tool that lets teachers design projects step-by-step. Users start off by naming their project and adding assignments for students to complete, such as answering a question by submitting a piece of writing. As soon as they complete the task you can view their work and offer feedback. Students can then review the work of their peers anonymously.

It's a great tool for conducting group nonfiction writing projects for history/social studies, science, technical subjects, or English language arts. ProjectWriter gives teachers the opportunity to break down units of study into smaller sections. This lets students demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of the key concepts and terms being taught. ProjectWriter also offers built-in vocabulary tools and teacher-created student accounts.

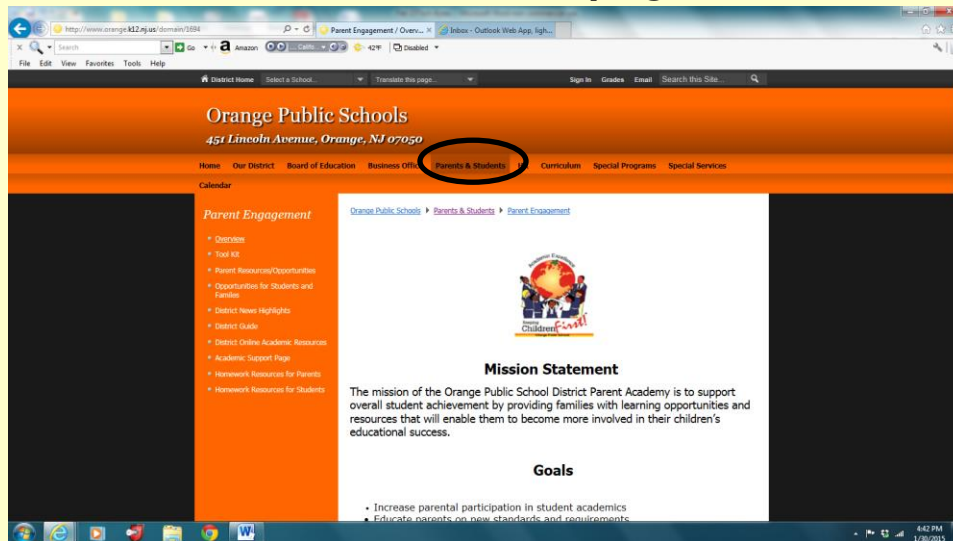

Reverse Image Search in Google Chrome

If you see an image in your **Google Chrome** browser that you want to find more information about (source, websites, etc.), right-click on the picture and select the "Search Google for this image" option in the menu.

Snap Arrange Windows on your Desktop

Sometimes you want to work on/view more than one document on your screen at the same time. You can do this by using the snap keyboard shortcuts to arrange windows side-by-side.

To snap your active window to the side of your desktop using keyboard keys, press the following:

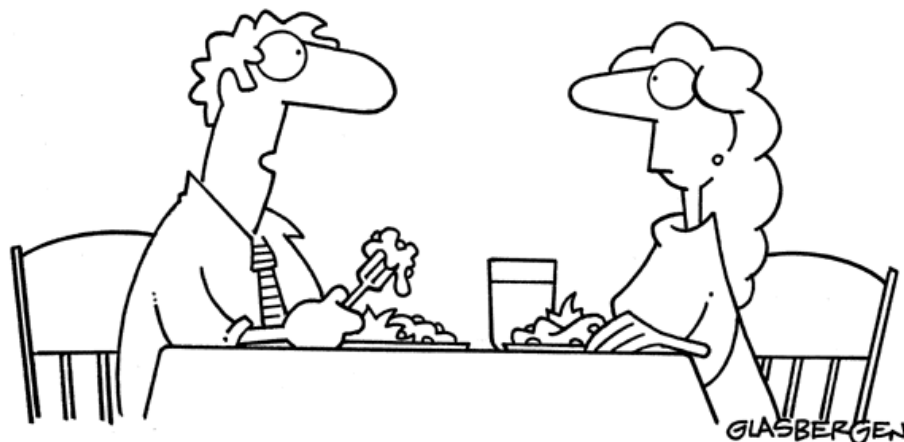
- Windows logo key -Picture of Windows logo key+Left Arrow to snap to the Left side of the screen;
- Windows logo key- Picture of Windows logo key+Right Arrow to snap to the Right side of the screen;
- Windows logo key- Picture of Windows logo key+Up Arrow to return to full screen;
- Windows logo key -Picture of Windows logo key+Down Arrow to minimize.
