Padlet in the Classroom to Collaborate & Create Interactive Sticky Notes!

Padlet is a web space where you can add files, links, videos, and more. You can create various walls to add your favorite content. People can also collaborate to continue adding to the same wall space. Imagine the potential for classroom uses!

Padlet features :

- Padlet is very easy to use and has a user friendly interface
- Padlet is web based and does not require any software installation
- •It allows you to easily add notes, text, images, videos, and drawings to your wall
- You can also add word documents from computer to your Padlet wall
- •Padlet provides a wide variety of layouts to choose from
- Padlet works across multiple devices including mobile phones
- •Any Padlet wall you create can be embedded into your blog or website.
- •It enhances collaborative work. Multiple people can post to the same wall at the same time.
- •Any Padlet wall can be exported in a variety of formats including, PDF, image, CSV, or Excel.
- •Padlet is completely free

Some suggested ways to use Padlet in class:

•Use is as a brainstorming tool. Create a Padlet wall for the whole class where they can collect and share ideas about a given topic.

•Students can use it as portfolio where they display their best work.

•Engage parents in the learning that is taking place in class by inviting them to visit the classroom Padlet wall

•Aggregate links and other multimedia resources relevant for students learning and post them on the classroom wall for everybody to check

•Use it as a book review page where students post reviews of the books they read

•Create walls for major cultural events and holidays of the year and invite students to search for information relevant to each of these events and share them with the class.

•Classroom Padlet wall can be used as an open space where students engage in group discussions and interactive exchange of ideas.

•Students can use Padlet for sharing their reflections on what they have learned and what they need help with.

• Be prepared - Write down your questions and information you'd like to share. Any changes at home, such as a new baby or a family member's illness that might have an impact on your child's schoolwork? Bring paper and pen so you can take notes.

• Arrive on time and work with the teacher to stay within the set meeting time. If you have more to discuss, arrange a follow-up visit.

• Ask for specifics about your child's work and progress. What will she be expected to master? How is she doing? What about behavior and social skills? Talk to the teacher about your child's study habits and what you've observed about work done at home.

• Have an open mind. If your child is having problems- whether academic, behavioral, or social- you and your child's teacher both want the same, positive outcome. Ask questions, but also listen. The conference is an important time to work together for an honest assessment of your child's progress.

• Determine the best way to stay in touch. Regular notes, emails, and calls will help create and maintain the important home-school connection.

• Follow through at home. You and your child's teacher may come up with some athome strategies to try. Touch base and let the teacher know how things are going.

Alternatives to YouTube

Use the search engine below to find educational videos that are not hosted on YouTube.

Some excellent educational content can be found on YouTube. However, many teachers cannot access YouTube in their classrooms. Therefore, I compiled a list of other places to find educational videos that don't rely on YouTube.

1. **School Tube** is a website dedicated to the sharing of videos created by students and teachers. School Tube allows teachers and schools to create their own channels for sharing their students' works. School Tube also provides excellent how-to resources, copyright-friendly media, and lesson plans for using video in the classroom.

2. **Teacher Tube** has been around for a while now, but I still run into teachers who have not heard of it. Teacher Tube provides user generated videos for teachers by teachers. Many of the videos on Teacher Tube have teachers sharing lesson plans in action. Some videos on Teacher Tube are simply inspirational. And other videos don't have teachers or students in them, but contain educational lessons none the less.

3. Next Vista is a nonprofit, advertising-free video sharing site run by Google Certified Teacher Rushton Hurley. Next Vista has three video categories. The Light Bulbs category is for videos that teach you how to do something and or provides an explanation of a topic. The Global Views video category contains videos created to promote understanding of cultures around the world. The Seeing Service video category highlights the work of people who are working to make a difference in the lives of others. Watch this interview I did with Rushton to learn more about Next Vista.

4. Academic Earth is a video depot for individual lectures and entire courses from some of the top universities in the United States. Visitors to Academic Earth will find lectures and courses from Yale, MIT, Berkeley, Harvard, Princeton, and Stanford.

5. **Snag Films** and its companion site Snag Learning are great places to watch full length documentaries from producers like National Geographic for free. Snag Learning provides a catalog of educational films that are accompanied by classroom discussion questions

5. Find educational blogs to discover new ideas, encouragement, and educational news.


6. Don't reinvent the wheel.
