
I am in need of your help to be successful over the summer.

Sort a bag of colored items (beads, paper clips) by color/ size. Then count the number in each pile. Talk about which pile has less/more/equal?	Keep track of how many times it rains over the summer. Create a rain graph and count how many times it rains.	Eat a popsicle!! Talk about what happens as you bite into it, as you suck on the ice, and why it melts.	Visit a local library. Sign-up for a library card and check out some new books to read.
Make a pattern using your family's shoes or socks. Describe the pattern using letters; AB, ABC, ABBC, AABC	Circle the letters in your name on a cereal/food box/newspaper. Talk about the sound each letter makes. Identify some middle/ last name letters.	Follow a simple recipe and cook a meal together. Recall what you did first/second/third.	Plant a seed and watch it grow.
Collect things from nature and talk about them. Make a nature collage. Classify objects into two groups. example (soft & hard)	Read a book together. Discuss the ending of the story. Make a prediction of what might happen next.	Conduct an experiment: Put some ice outside on a hot day. Predict what will happen, make an observation of what is happening, and then make a conclusion about why it melted.	Visit the library. Take out a book about summer. Read it together and talk about it.
Go on a shape hunt. Count how many of each shape you find. Talk about which shape you found the most/least?	Cut/tear out letters in your name from newspapers and magazines. Then find pictures of objects that begin with those letters. Paste them on paper and make a name picture.	Make waves in a bottle! Fill a water bottle half way with water, add some oil, and shake! Watch what happens, then talk about it.	Read a book several times together. Then ask your child to retell the story using their own words.
Draw about how you feel today. Predict how you will feel tomorrow.	Go to the Park and enjoy a family picnic	Visit a grocery store and talk about what happen there. Take Pictures!	Take a trip on the train/bus/taxi/walk. Take pictures and talk about your adventure (what did you see/hear?)


