# A note about Dynamic Learning Map (DLM) Accessibility

Having accessible content is essential to the success of the student. The DLM has integrated accessible content by developing various test-let levels for each New Jersey Student Learning Standards, using grade-appropriate core vocabulary, supporting growth through A and alternate pathways through the nodes, and following item writing guidelines designed to prevent barriers to access. The system uses information about the student, including teacher reports of prior academic achievement and expressive and receptive communication, and any previous DLM assessment results, to determine where the student should start his or her first DLM assessment in each grade. Accessibility is also supported through the Personal Needs and Preferences (PNP) profile. Each student's IEP team decides which tools and supports should be provided. The teacher records these choices in the system and the student's assessment experience is customized based on those tools and supports.

# **Co-Teaching observation by Consultant Dr. Sinha At Cleveland Street School with Ms. Ojentis & Mr. Gold**

Our students are experiencing the benefits of *Effective Co-Teaching Strategies* taught by Dr. Sinha of Rutgers University.

**Supportive Co-teaching** - where the one member of the co-teaching team takes the lead role and the other member rotates among students to provide support.

**Parallel Co-teaching** - where support personnel and the classroom teacher instruct different heterogeneous groups of students.

**Complementary Co-teaching** - where a member of the co-teaching team does something to supplement or complement the instruction provided by the other member of the team (e.g., models note taking on a transparency, paraphrases the other co-teacher's statements).

**Team Teaching** - where the members of the team co-teach along side one another and share responsibility for planning, teaching, and assessing the progress of all students in the class.

### Students identified safe and unsafe practices on the playground Holiday Health & Safety Tips

**Wash your hands often**. Keeping hands clean is one of the most important steps you can take to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others. Wash your hands with soap and clean running water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and clean water are not available, use an alcohol-based product.

**Stay Warm.** Cold temperatures can cause serious health problems, especially infants and older adults. Stay dry, and dress warmly in several layers of loose-fitting, tightly woven clothing. Check on children, the elderly and pets.

**Stress management.** Get enough sleep, balance work, home, and play, get support from family and friends, keep a relaxed and positive outlook.
