Orange's Bison Robotics Club Will Represent the United States in the RoboCupJunior World Competition in the Netherlands

Orange Preparatory Academy's (OPA) Bison Robotics Club will represent the United States in the 14th Annual RoboCupJunior World Competition in Eindhoven, the Netherlands, where over 250 teams from 34 countries around the world will participate. The event will be held between June 24 and July 1, 2013. The team qualified for the competition after receiving a special award for Best Choreography in the Robot Dance challenge at the RoboCupJunior NY/NJ 2013 Competition and will represent the United States in the Dance Secondary category at the prestigious international robotics event.

The Bison Robotics Club consists of eighth and ninth grade students. They are Lopez Georges, DeJan Carlisle-Miller, Deshaun Maisonable, Angelo Raymond, Fabian Spann and Ernest Bynum. Their team advisors are teachers Ms. Sharonda Tanner and Ms. Olivia Silva. The team including "Brittany the Robot" is diligently preparing for the competition, refining their routine and raising money to finance their trip.

The team qualified by competing in the 8th Annual RoboCupJunior NY/NJ Competition at the Liberty Science Center on April 14, 2013. There were over 44 teams from New York, Pennsylvania, California, North Carolina, Connecticut and New Jersey at the competition, with over 170 participants. The Bison Robotics Club participated in the Robot Dance challenge. They designed, built and programmed a robot to move independently to music in a 2-minute dance routine. Judges and audience members were delightfully entertained by the synchronization of the robot to members of the team and the music.

"Their hard work, creativity and preparation paid off and we are extremely proud that they entered this event and have been invited to represent the United States in this acclaimed international competition," said OPA Principal, Mr. Darrell Medley.

"This is really exciting," said, ninth grader, Lopez Georges, "We worked so hard to program our robot to move to the music and we are glad that we will get the opportunity to compete again at the international competition."

Mr. Ronald C. Lee, Superintendent of Schools, who has cultivated such opportunities for students in Orange, said, "To

represent the United States at an event that will bring together students from over thirty countries is a significant honor for Orange and we will assist the Bison Robotics Club to raise the necessary funds to send the six team members, their advisors and chaperones to the Netherlands for this once in a lifetime event." The estimated cost to attend the RoboCupJunior World Competition is approximately \$20,000.

To finance their trip, the OPA Bison Robotics Club is raising money and accepting donations. Team advisors, Ms. Tanner and Ms. Silva, are leading a grassroots effort to raise the necessary funds. Parties interested in making a donation can contact Orange Preparatory Academy at 973-677-4135.



ORANGE TEENS DANCE FOR A GLOBAL CAUSE

On Thursday, May 16, 2013 at the Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA) Auditorium at 7pm, the OPA Dance Ensemble will host a concert titled "Ignite: Do More Than Just Watch" to raise awareness about forced child soldiers in Uganda. Students from the OPA Dance Ensemble perform each spring to show off their talent and artistic ability, but this year they have a more noble purpose as a theme for their concert. Under the leadership of dance instructor, Gianna Mistry, these young dancers have decided to make this performance a benefit concert to raise awareness about a global humanitarian cause.

The funds raised at the concert will be donated to the Ugandan charity organization Friends of Orphans Uganda that rescues, rehabilitates, and reintegrates these children back into civil society through dance, arts, sports, and education programs. The founder of this organization was once himself a child soldier, and now dedicates his life to restoring the childhoods robbed from hundreds of innocent children and rebuilding a community ravaged by war. Child abduction and human trafficking in northern Uganda has forced innocent youth to serve as child soldiers during years of warfare. This tragedy has touched the hearts of the 8th and 9th graders involved in the ensemble, and they want to use their abilities to make a difference.

The dance ensemble at Orange High School, under the leadership of Ms. Tosha Brown, will participate in the program. The Orange Preparatory Academy Auditorium is located at 400 Central Avenue, Orange, NJ and this concert is open to the public. Tickets for this event are \$5 for adults and \$2 for students with ID.

This program will provide her with a unique understanding of hands-on experiments and science at a world-leading nuclear physics laboratory.

The PAN summer program will introduce Miss Tesfaye "to the fundamentals of the extremely small domain of atomic nuclei and its connection to the extremely large domain of astrophysics and cosmology." She will attend the program, in August, at Michigan State University, one of the biggest university campuses in the country. There she will have the opportunity to:

- Learn scientific research in one of the top rare-isotope laboratories in the world
- Experience the fields of astrophysics, cosmology, and nuclear science
- Perform nuclear physics experiments

"He Said, She Said" Inaugural Competition at Heywood Avenue School

On May 3, 2013, Orange Public Schools hosted an inaugural competitive event. Steeped in Common Core State Standards for English Language Arts, the first annual "He Said, She Said" public speaking competition challenged our students to engage in the research and writing processes while honing their speaking and presentation skills.

Donning a top hat and beard, third grade student, Keshima Smith effectively recited an excerpt from The Gettysburg Address. Her performance earned her first place in the prepared speech category. Following closely in second was Zaki Williams of Forest Street School and Jamaal Ndiaye of Oakwood Avenue School in third place.

The second category was extemporaneous speech and the participants gave brief speeches on the role of the FCC, why the Titanic sank, a current piece of legislation (immigration) and the biography of a technological innovator (Amazon.com founder, Jeff Bezos). Lincoln Avenue School students Nahome Hagos (4th grade) and Curtis Mark (5th grade) placed second and third, respectively, while 7th grade Rosa Parks' student Aneela Kanhai won first place.

The final category called for a duo to deliver a tech-assisted speech. Representing Forest, who took third place, 7th grade students Destiny Duffaut and Eduardo Fajardo delivered a speech on the privacy rights of celebrities. Fifth grade student Cassandra Chatonda and 4th grade student Tracy Ware represented the second place team, from Lincoln, with their presentation on the mandatory seat belt law. Finally, 7th grade Rosa Parks students Jemima Pierre and Estefany Galdamez won first place with their presentation on "Books: Are They a Thing Of The Past?"

With a total score of 736, Lincoln Avenue School was the first place team. Coming in second, with a combined score of 722 was Rosa Parks Central Community School and Forest Street coming in third with 613 points.

The district appreciated the efforts and commitment of the students, staff, and families who supported this event. In particular, event host, Dr. Paula Howard, Deputy Superintendent, judges, Superintendent Ronald C. Lee, Orange High School history teacher Jean Jackson and OHS graduate Khemani Gibson and student assistant, Chinwendu Obi. Event organizer, Ms. Erica Stewart, Administrator for Special Projects, expressed gratitude to the teachers who coached and prepared the students from each of the participating schools. She stated, "Our students have the potential to become our future leaders and the district has the responsibility to prepare them for a variety of positions in life."

Orange Students Perform at Shakesperience: NJ

On May 7 and 8, 2013, The Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey hosted teachers and students, from schools across the state, including Orange High School and Orange Preparatory Academy students, for the 7th Annual *Shakesperience: NJ*, at the F.M. Kirby Shakespeare Theatre in Madison. *Shakesperience:NJ* is a non-competitive forum, highlighting and celebrating the study of Shakespeare for students in grades 5 – 12. The festival is held over a two day period, bringing together a diverse mix of students and schools for an entire day of performing and observing short scenes from a variety of Shakespeare's works.

On May 7, OPA and OHS students performed excerpts from "The Complete Works of William Shakespeare Abridged/Revised" featuring scenes from <u>Romeo and Juliet</u> and <u>Hamlet</u>. "The Complete Works" was originally presented by the cast and crew in December at the OPA auditorium. Ms. Tammy Baldwin, OHS Stage Crew Advisor, who accompanied the students along with Ms. Dana Levin, OHS drama instructor, gave a perspective on the day's event, stating, "The students really enjoyed the lectures and demonstrations. A few of the students were chosen to participate in a hands-on demonstration where they actually got to stage a fight with real swords," she added, "After that, awards were given out to numerous students. It really is not a competition, but they [the festival organizers] like to acknowledge the actors that give stellar performances. Along with an award title, students are presented with a small token of appreciation, a Shakespeare paperback and a big round of applause from the audience."

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At Rosa Parks Central Community School (RPCCS), students are the expert teachers when it comes to using iPads. These "Junior Teachers", in Mrs. Maxwell's 2nd grade class, are teaching Mrs. Sanders' 2nd grade class how to sign on to the iPads, how to begin a Study Island test session, how to search on the internet using Google and also iPad etiquette. The students loved exploring various websites about insects! Second grade students in Mrs. Maxwell, Ms. Mitchell, and Mrs. Sanders' classes are also using the iPads for guided reading. Students work with a partner and videotape each other on the iPads reading a guided reading book aloud. Junior Teachers then score their peers by using a Fluency Reading Rubric. Students are scored on a scale from 1-4 on expression & volume, phrasing, smoothness, and pace. After reviewing their videos, students always try to improve their score by reading again. "Junior Teachers" provide feedback and suggestions for improvement. RPCCS says, "We love our iPads!"

Mr. Reggie Miller Addressed Orange High School Students About the 3 P's

On May 9, 2013, during the last block for the day, students filled the cafeteria at Orange High School for a special presentation from Mr. Reggie Miller, director of the Male Student Support Program offered to young men at Orange Preparatory Academy and Orange High School through UMDNJ (University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey). His presentation "A Struggle to Stay in the Race" was an insightful reflection of his personal experience growing up in Orange, his academic experience, his current association with the school district and the Orange community. Mr. Miller outlined the dynamics of the 3 P's: Parents, Principals and Police, their impact on the youth of Orange, in particular, young men, and how to overcome obstacles in these areas for successful outcomes at home, in school and in your community.

The first of the 3 P's are Parents, who "protect the home", and how some students become "spoiled", leading to a lack of confidence, respect, and guidance. Principals is the next P, referring to their charge to "protect the school" and the responsibilities of the school administration, of teachers, and parents in combating bad grades and bad behavior. The final P stands for Police, who "protect the streets" and the views of some that contribute to strained relationships with young people that contribute to gang and drug problems in a community. Mr. Miller puts them all together with a prescription for resolving some of the concerns outlined in his presentation. He recommends that the 3P's work together to guide young people and teach them mutual respect.

Maestro Jeffrey Grogan Visits Orange High School

Through the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra's community engagement programs, Maestro Jeffrey Grogan, the renowned Music Director of the New Jersey Youth Symphony, visited Orange Preparatory Academy and Orange High School to once again instruct budding instrumentalists.

Earlier in the month, Maestro Grogan met with music teachers Ms. Buelah Cox and Ms. Sini Vineyard's strings students on the stage at Orange Preparatory Academy. Ms. Vineyard stated, "He was impressed by our strings program and how well the students played considering the majority of them had never played an instrument or their specific string instrument before this school year." "The students were very responsive to his teaching and suggestions," she added, "They were attentive and seemed to really soak in every piece of information and advice from Mr. Grogan."

During the session, Mr. Grogan worked on intonation (playing in the center of the pitch), balance and balancing solos vs. accompaniment, developing confidence in playing and performing, bringing out different characters, and listening to and watching each other to be in-sync. "One method that he used to achieve unity was to have the students sit in a very tight circle and then play in a chamber music style without the conductor," said Ms. Vineyard.

As Mr. Grogan worked with the students, complimented them and encouraged them to play from their hearts, their confidence level noticeably improved. The students truly enjoyed themselves. The workshop changed their playing and their perception of and confidence in themselves as performers and string players. They are eager to have Maestro Grogan back for another workshop.

On May 10, 2013, Maestro Grogan guest conducted the OHS Concert Band as they rehearsed the piece "Fire Dance" by David Shaffer. The band will perform the piece at their spring concert on Wednesday, May 29, 2013. The OHS Concert Band is directed by Mr. Steven Reeves.

After a formal introduction and warm up by Mr. Reeves, Maestro Grogan began. He addressed issues such as "air support" to benefit tone quality. He also mentioned and stressed that the articulations and performance indicators such as staccato and forte-piano should be taken very literally. Mr. Reeves commented, "I liked how he introduced the concept of producing, playing the forte-piano dynamic. He asked the band to play a whole note with the forte volume, then asked them to do the same at a piano volume. The ensemble responded very quickly and was able to apply that concept to different measures within the music."

Maestro Grogan was particularly impressed with the high caliber of musicians that comprised this season's concert band. He made an appeal to the band to audition for the Greater Newark Youth Orchestra. He specifically encouraged the principal horn player, Achiana Ogany, to audition for the 2013-2014 season. "She genuinely has a considerable amount of natural talent and ability," said Mr. Reeves, "I can recall serving in the Greater Newark Youth Orchestra (GNYO) during my junior and senior year while attending Orange High School. I look forward to other students in this music program participating in the GNYO and eventually the New Jersey Youth Orchestra."

Mr. Reeves is eager for the opportunity to have Mr. Grogan return. "He is most certainly welcomed to come and guest conduct whenever he can."

Sculptor Chakaia Booker Visits with Art Students at Rosa Parks Central Community School

Chakaia Booker, an internationally acclaimed sculptor, known for her work with rubber tires, visited with art students at the Rosa Parks Central Community School (RPCCS) on May 23. She spoke with the middle school art students and Art Club in Ms. Agnieszka Wszolkowski's class. Ms. Booker met with the students for an hour and a half adorned in her wearable sculpture, an intricate headdress. The students were very excited to hear her describe her work and see slides of some of her creations. Ms. Booker discussed her early work with wearable art and creating sculptures and clothing from discarded materials. She described how she created clothing and explained that dressing and even the act of cooking are art forms. She also spoke of her work with large installation pieces created for the public arena.

Students were engaged with her presentation and asked questions about her craft and what inspired her. Several students attested to their interest in pursuing art as a career and and were encourgared to follow their dreams.

Ms. Wszolkowski plans to have her students explore and use some of the same materials used by Ms. Booker for their art projects. Ms. Booker's visit was arranged by RPCCS Principal Ms. Cayce J. Cummins.

Ms. Booker's bio describes her as follows:



Chakaia Booker, an internationally acclaimed sculptor, has long worked with discarded materials, exploring and redefining their meaning and purpose. Her choice of materials, particularly her use of rubber tires, lends deep layers of meaning to her work, infusing the sculptures with social, political and cultural undertones.

For Booker, the sculptures created with tires address African-American identity, symbolizing the strength of African-American resilience, while the color nuances evoke the complexities of the African Diaspora. The tread patterns and repetitive geometric shapes in Booker's work are also reminiscent of traditional African textiles.

Booker, who lives in New York and works in Manhattan and Allentown, Pa., has pieces in the permanent collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City, Storm King Art Center in Mountainville, New York, and the Museum of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in Washington, D.C. She has exhibited throughout the U.S. as well as internationally, including Galeria Marlborough in Madrid, Spain, and Galerie Pfriem in Lacoste, France.

Booker is a carefully assembled artist who sees herself as a sculpture in the way she presents herself and the daily tasks that she performs. She often dresses herself in wearable sculptures which are also used as clothing and head-coverings. Booker has studied a variety of different subjects including African dance, ceramics, weaving, basketry and t'ai chi, all of which contribute to her artistic practices in unexpected ways.

Booker states: "My intention is to translate simple, yet complex, materials into imagery that stimulates people to reconsider the expressive nature of art and how broad complex cultural transformations can, and will, continue to be expressed through common materials. My desire is to create, through whatever materials I choose, to explore my ever changing voice."

Students investigated questions from the Physical, Earth and Life Sciences using materials ranging from hydrogen peroxide to human hair.

Students from third to seventh grade grasped the idea of using the "scientific method" of investigation to conduct experiments such as the extraction of strawberry DNA, determining the exact temperature of fog formation and discovering the conditions for hatching 17-year hibernating cicadas. Second graders demonstrated their skills by creating "insect dioramas" after completing their FOSS Science Module on insects. First grade class projects included live grown plants, incorporating knowledge and materials from their FOSS Science New Plants Module.

Experiments displayed included written reports following the Common Core State Standards. Displays were very informative, colorful and intriguing, representing the pride of the students of LAS. Our hard-working students are anxiously awaiting the presentation of gold, silver, and bronze medals. First, Second, and Third place winners will move on to compete in the Annual Orange District-Wide Science Fair to be held from June 11-13, 2013 at Park Avenue School.

The fair was judged by a number of district employees and administrators, who evaluated each project's use of the Scientific Methods, understanding of principles and overall quality.
